ONE FURTHER CONVICTION.—James W. Dunan, late of the Confederate Army, was recently tried by a Military Commission at Savannah, Georgia, and sentenced to be confined in Leavenworth for fifteen years in Fort Pittsburg. The charge was murder growing out of Dunan's connection with the military prison at Andersonville. He will doubtless be pardoned by the President, as Jeff Davis would be if tried and convicted.
