From Meadow Lake—Sad Accident.

MEADOW LAKE, AUG. 17.

On Friday afternoon, August 17th, at

about 3 o'clock, a sad accident occurred by

which an estimable lady, the wife of R. Mar-

coux and child, a girl aged four years, lost

their lives. A party of six, consisting of

two men, two women and two children, went

out to sail upon Meadow Lake. After sail-

ing to the large dam of the South Yuba

Canal Company, the party turned about to

return home, when the boat capsized and

precipitated all into the Lake. All were

saved but the woman and child. The body

of the latter was immediately recovered, but

several hours elapsed before the former was

obtained.

Several boats were immediately despatched

to the scene of the disaster, and many

bathers were employed to recover the body of

the woman, without success. Grappling

irons were then obtained, and at about half

past five success crowned their efforts.

Deceased was of French descent, and was

esteemed by all who knew her. She was

formerly a resident of Gold Hill, and leaves

a husband, and one boy aged eight years, to

mourn her loss.

Immediately upon receipt of the news of

the accident, large numbers of the citizens

lined the shores of the lake and proffered all

the service in their power, and expressed

deep sympathy for the unhappy husband

and child.
