BY STATE TELEGRAPH.

[From the Gold Hill News of last evening.]

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—The President received large numbers of visitors to-day, and was closeted with Thurston Weed and Raymond a long time. The President is hurrying up appointments in contemplation of several weeks absence from the city, to visit Chicago, to make a tour of the country.

Stanton's position in the Cabinet continues to be actively discussed. The Philadelphia delegations persist in a demand for his removal, although they are willing he shall be let down with a mission to Madrid or St. Petersburg. Stanton keeps silent to outsiders as to whether he inclines the Philadelphia movement or not. It is currently believed that he is retained in the Cabinet by the influence of Seward, Weed and Raymond and that he will be retained at least until the meeting of Congress.

Lewis D. Campbell goes home to Ohio to-day, and will run for Congress against Schenck.
New York, August 24.—The Post's money article says this gold is excited and scarce, three quarters and one per cent. per day being paid for loans.

The evening's Commercial says: The Bull combination can run up the premium as they please; the exchange market is being led by the peculiar condition of gold, holders of bills being anxious to sell without purchasers, because investors are reluctant to buy at the present rate of gold.

The Herald has information that Jeff Davis will be released on bail or parole to answer in Court at Richmond next October.

The Tribune has a report that General Sheridan has been relieved from his command and General Steadman sent to take his place.

The Tribune reiterates editorially the charge that Sheridan's dispatches about the late riot were tempered with before publication; that dispatches of greater importance from him have not been published at all, and that therefore he has complained to the President, and fallen under the President's disfavor.

Chicago, Aug. 24.—The Wisconsin Union State Convention has appointed a delegation to attend the Philadelphia

Convention of Southern Unionists, including Governor Fairchild, Senator Howe, James T. Lewis, Thomas S. Allen and Holbert E. Paine.

The Massachusetts delegation includes Governor Bullock, Ex-Governors Andrews, Clifford and Washburn, Sumner, Ralph Waldo Emerson, James Russell Lowell, Genery Twichell, Rev. Edward M. Kirk and Rev. Rollin H. Neale.

Governor Curtin has issued a circular expressing his earnest desire to have Pennsylvania represented at the Southern Unionist Convention, and inviting co-operation for the appointment of delegates.

The Democratic National Union Convention have agreed upon a call for a State Convention at Albany on the 11th of September to nominate candidates for Governor, etc., for the State of New York. The Democratic Committee issue the call, addressing it to all electors opposed to the measures and principles of the present majority in Congress and in favor of the policy and national restoration adopted by President Johnson and the Philadelphia Convention. The National Union Committee endorse the call so addressed.

The cholera seems to have lost its force in the Eastern and Southern cities, and to have broken out with renewed violence in St. Louis, where the Board of Health have forbidden the figures to be published. The deaths at St. Louis yesterday, so far as could be ascertained by the local reporters, from counting the interments in the principal cemeteries, numbered 119. It is believed that twenty thousand people have left the city. The weather is very cold, damp and unfavorable. The barrels were burned last night at every street corner.

By Atlantic Cable.
LONDON, Aug. 23.—A treaty of peace was to have been signed yesterday between Austria and Prussia and Bavaria. King George of Hanover is at Vienna and has been formally advised by Prussia that he must abdicate the crown. The Queen of Hanover is, however, making every effort to secure the succession of her son.

Advises from the Island of Candia say the Christian population has demanded certain measures of reform from the Turkish Government, which being refused they had risen in arms, and displayed the standard of the protesting powers.

The Governor treats the Christians as rebels and has sent for reinforcements of Turkish troops. There had been some fighting, and the U. S. Consulate had sustained damage.

Berlin, Aug. 22.—The Prussian Commissioners have concluded peace with Bavaria and Hesse Darmstadt, in accordance with the Prussian demands. Bavaria renounces its northern portion, composed of Luchtenfels and the walled town of Culmbach, to Prussia, and promises to pay Prussia thirty million florins. Darmstadt cedes to Prussia the Landgraviate of Hesse, and Prussia obtains the exclusive right to govern Mentzen.

Bavaria retains Upper Hesse, which will, however, be incorporated in the Confederation of Northern Germany, under Prussia. The Prussian troops have commenced to evacuate Bohemia.

Paris, Aug. 23.—The Patrie says: Louis Napoleon will leave Venice direct to Italy.
Florence, Aug. 23.—Victor Emanuel proclaims an amnesty to political exiles and prisoners.

Pest, Aug. 22.—After the conclusion of peace the Emperor Francis Joseph will appoint a responsible Hungarian Ministry and convene the Hungarian Diet, probably early in September.

Athens, Aug. 18.—The Christian insurgents on the island of Candia number 2,500, and hold important points against the Turkish soldiers, who have commenced hostilities against them.
