LOCAL AFFAIRS.

UNION CLUB MOVEMENT.—The subscription list which was started for a Union Club on Friday evening, was very numerously signed yesterday. We saw it a little after noon, and there were not less than two hundred names appended thereto. It will make a very lively showing before the middle of this week.

DEDICATION OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.—The services of dedicating the Methodist Church will be had today at the new stone edifice, under the direction of Bishop Kingsley.

NEVADA COUNTY UNION CONVENTION.—The Union Central Committee of Nevada county met at Lone, on the 22d instant. They set the time for holding the Convention at Lone, on Monday, the 24th of September next. The time for holding primary meetings for electing delegates to the County Convention was set for Tuesday, September 18th. The appointment of delegates is as follows: Lone, 2; Kniekershook Mill, 2; Mammoth, 4; Washington, 2; Hendrix & Bowstead's Mill, 1; Twin River (Toiyabe City), 5; Hot Creek, 1; Belmont, 5; San Antonio, 1; Lawrence, Logan and Crystal Springs (Pahrangat Lake District) 1 each, and Northumberland, 1. The text of voters at the primary meetings, is the voting for D. R. Ashley at the last election and the endorsement of the Constitutional Amendment proposed by Congress.—*Rose River Record.*

ROBBERY HIS BUSINESS.—The Rockland (Mo.) Gazette says that Capt. Sylvanus Haskell, of that place recently lost his sash key. A day or two subsequently, he pulled a board from his barn by accident, and found behind it \$5000 in U. S. bonds, wrapped in a newspaper. The money proved to have been taken from his safe. He watched the package and was surprised and heart-broken to find that the thief was his adopted son, a young man in whose future promise he had the highest confidence. A confession made by the young scoundrel revealed the fact that he had at different times robbed the wealthy and kind-hearted Captain of \$13,000.

A RESIGNATION WHICH IS TO BE REGRETTED.—The Eastern Slope of yesterday contains the following piece of intelligence:

We learn that the Hon. Charles Lambert has sent in his resignation as State Senator, with a view of going before the County Convention as a candidate for County Treasurer. The people of Washoe will regret to lose the services of Mr. Lambert in the Legislature. We say, however, without disrespect to our late Senator, indulging in the hope that the Convention will select quite as good a man to serve the balance of his unexpired term.

BEN BUTLER DEMANDS EQUAL SUFFRAGE.—General Butler in a recent speech at Lyon insisted that the Union party should inscribe "equal suffrage" on its banner. Hear him:

President Johnson should have said to Southern men: "Now enfranchise the colored race," and they would have done it—not for the love they have toward us, for they didn't love us before the war—do they love us since we whipped them? South Carolina adopted the amendment to the Constitution, but she did it under protest—did it because she was obliged to, and claims the right to undo the work when she has the power. And this is reconstruction. Thus things went on. We must fight it out at the polls, in electing the next Congress, and if we beat them again we will say, "Equal rights to all men." We are opposed by the same men who opposed the war, and we must see to it that the nation is again united, and that the South is reconstituted, not by reconstructed rebels, but by loyal men, and then we shall have harmony, peace and prosperity.

RESOLUTIONS OF THE ILLINOIS CONVENTION AT SPRINGFIELD.

Resolved, That in the great Union party of the nation, whose councils safely guided the country through the rebellion, and whose armies conquered and subdued it, we recognize the party whose principles alone can be relied upon and adhered to with safety in the reconstruction of the State Governments of the rebellious States.

Resolved, That we cordially endorse the policy of the Congress of the United States with reference to the restoration of the State Governments destroyed by the rebellion; that we fully approve of the amendment to the Constitution of the United States, adopted by Congress, and submitted for ratification to the people.

Resolved, That under the Constitution, which provides for a qualified veto upon the legislation of Congress by the President; that when that body has enacted laws by the constitutional majority of two-thirds over the President's negative, the President himself, as well as the people, should bow to their decision as that of the highest power in the nation, and that any attempt upon his part to oppose the faithful execution of such laws and to substitute in lieu thereof his own will, is an unwarrantable usurpation, and dangerous to the liberties of the people.

Resolved, That Congress, without the cooperation of the President, has the sole power of proposing amendments to the National Constitution; that, as the people's representative, it is the only standard of the national will, and that in the present disturbed condition of the Southern States in their relation to the General Government, we recognize Congress as the supreme power, and will sanction its action in all just and patriotic modes in behalf of the constitutional amendment now submitted to the States.

Resolved, That it should be a recognized maxim in political science to give to the friends and defenders of a Government its direction and control; that to its enemies and assailants should be accorded only such privileges as can be intrusted without damage to the republic.

Resolved, That we regard the Congressional act with us as one of the great landmarks of union and liberty, and that we are unalterably opposed to any change or abridgment thereof.

Resolved, That our sympathies as a party go out in favor of the struggles of all liberty-loving people for freedom, believing that we should accord to others all that we claim for ourselves.

Resolved, That in common with, and as part of the great Union party of the nation, we hereby tender to the soldiers and sailors our most unfeigned and heartfelt thanks for such achievements and triumphs that will ever immortalize them and the nation whose Government they saved; and we trust the time may never come when the people will cease to hold in grateful remembrance, or fail to reward the preservers of the Union.

Resolved, That we most cordially endorse the action of S. W. Mackon, our member of Congress, for the State at large, for the able, faithful, fearless and patriotic manner in which he has performed the important duties intrusted to him in representing the State of Illinois in the national councils.

The resolutions were unanimously adopted without discussion. Great enthusiasm prevailed. The following supplementary resolutions and resolutions were then read by a member of the body, and were adopted by all the members of the Convention rising to their feet in silence:

WHEREAS, Since the assembling of the last Union State Convention the favorite son of Illinois, Abraham Lincoln, then President, has been stricken down by the hand of an assassin, and the nation left to mourn the loss of its Chief Magistrate and the foremost man in the cause of freedom and the Union; therefore

Resolved, That this Convention, standing in the immediate neighborhood of the great martyr's bones, reverently in honor of the illustrious dead, memory of whom lies enthroned among all the virtues which adorn a man, and we solemnly pledge anew our devotion to the great principles for which he was slain.
