BY STATE TELEGRAPH

[From the Gold Hill News of last evening.]

Chicago, Sept. 21.—Since the 20th of July it has rained here and throughout the Northwest thirty-one days, and the amount of water that has fallen is unprecedented—being twenty-one and one-half inches here. The corn crop is greatly injured, and great damage has been caused by the floods.

The Southern Unionist delegation, on tour through the North, arrived at Cleveland, Ohio, yesterday, and will arrive at Chicago October 1st. They are on a great campaign tour, and speaking at all prominent places in the North.

New York, Sept. 21.—The Tribune's New Orleans special correspondent says: "I have received information that five men were hired to assassinate Governor Wells when on his way to this city from his late visit to his home in the Parish of St. Landry. The Governor having received information of their designs, avoided them by taking a circuitous route of four hundred miles."

Information has been received from different parishes that bands of lawless men are committing outrages on white and black Unionists.

The Academy of Music in this city opened last Monday week. Every night that national airs were played they were emphatically hissed and groaned down by the local audience.

New York, Sept. 21.—The World's special says Major General Conca was to-day appointed by the President, Collector of Boston, vice Hannibal Hamlin resigned.

Chicago, Sept. 21.—By express orders from the President, the clerks at the White House are forbidden to furnish the press with lists of appointments. The same rule has been adopted in the Treasury Department.

New York, Sept. 21.—Florida papers say the island of Dry Tortugas was fired upon by a strange craft bearing the Confederate flag; and those there are confident somebody was seriously wounded by a shell. The vessel was a schooner rigged and painted lead color, with four guns on each broadside which were all discharged at the distance of two miles from the island, when the boat put to sea. The United States revenue cutter was lying in the harbor at the time, but having no steam up, she was unable to pursue.

Chicago, Sept. 21.—Wendell Phillips has been nominated for Congress by the Workingmen's Convention at Boston, and it is understood that he will be regularly nominated by the Republicans. Mr. A. H. Rice declines re-election.

Wm. Windom and Ignatius Donnelly have been nominated for re-election to Congress, in Minnesota.

Reports of damage by floods since Monday show a loss of two millions of dollars, not counting the injury to the crops. The railroads all over the Western States are much impeded. Indian-

apolis alone claims a loss of \$100,000 by the flooding of stores.

Raleigh, N. C., Sept. 21.—The State Convention of the Unconditional Union men of North Carolina was held here today. Alfred Dockery was nominated for Governor. The Constitutional Amendment was endorsed. Governor Holden, who was chosen President, delivered an able address heartily indorsing the candidate and platform.

WORK ON THE PACIFIC RAILROAD.

We find the following interesting report of the progress of the work on the Pacific Railroad in the Sacramento Union of Friday:

The work of extending the track of the Pacific Railroad beyond Alta was commenced several days ago, and about four miles have been laid beyond that point. The road bed is completed, or nearly so, to Cisco, and there will be no interruption in laying the iron until that point is reached. Cisco is located about twenty-two miles beyond Alta and fifteen miles this side of the summit. As at least a half mile per day is laid, Cisco will be reached before the first of November. The entire force of workmen on the road will, when the Winter's snow renders it necessary, be transferred to the eastern slope. On the return of Spring grading across the snow-belt of the summit will be resumed. Cisco will therefore probably remain the terminus of the road until June or July next, at which time a long stride will be taken to some point on the eastern slope. If the main tunnel is not completed at that time a temporary track will be laid across the summit. Tunnel No. 2, at Emigrant Gap, a short distance beyond Cisco, was completed on Wednesday. This tunnel is three hundred and fifty feet long and is five thousand feet above the level of the sea. There are two other tunnels on the line which are being worked as rapidly as possible. One will be two hundred feet and the other four hundred feet long. The main tunnel at the summit will be about one thousand six hundred feet long. All the tunnels are made wide enough for a double track. Cisco is located about ninety-two miles from Sacramento.

WHAT THEY THINK OF DeLONG IN YUBA COUNTY.—After quoting Mr. DeLong's remarks made in Virginia City, concerning his connection with the Marysville Rifles, the Marysville Appeal adds:

Mr. DeLong is a candidate for United States Senator to succeed Gen. Nye, and he is laboring very hard to throw off the odium which attaches to him by being a candidate on the Breckinridge ticket in Yuba county, in 1862.
