Bulgarian Premier Has Asked for an Armistice; Huns 'Kamerading' in Bunches on West Front

Hindenburg Line Is Again Crossed

British Operating On Vast Front Northwest of Cambrai—Sweeping Their Way Through

LONDON, Sept. 27.—The British opened an attack at 5:20 this morning over a wide front south of the Senece river and General Haig reported that their progress was satisfactory. The British advanced their line last night in the region of Arleux.

Working On 13 mile Front

(By United Press)
WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, Sept. 27.—The British are attacking in the direction of Cambrai and smashing their way forward on a thirteen-mile front, penetrating more than three miles at some points. They crossed a strip of the Hindenburg line seven miles wide, including five miles

of the canal du Nord. Hundreds of prisoners were taken. Generals Byng's and Herne's armies and the Canadians are participating. At 7:55 the British were advancing on Bourlon spur, four miles west of Cambrai, where the Germans are surrendering in great droves. Tanks reached Flesquieres, five miles southwest of Cambrai, at 8:30, the infantry pouring in behind.

Allied Cavalry Advancing

LONDON, Sept. 27.—Allied cavalry is believed to have reached the plain just south of Uskub, according to unofficial dispatches from Salonika, and Serbian infantry is probably now within ten or fifteen miles from Uskub.

An autopsy was held yesterday on the remains of Captain W. J. McCabe, who died on the operating table of a hospital in that city yesterday morning. The autopsy revealed the fact that McCabe's kidneys and heart were in bad condition.

Through a search of his desk in the office of the adjutant general it was discovered that he had a brother, James F. McCabe, in Philadelphia, and two sisters, Mrs. William O'Leary and Mrs. V. D. Cliff, in Detroit, Mich. They have been communicated with, but no reply has yet been received to the telegrams. The funeral arrangements will depend on the answers to the wires.

Captain McCabe was a native of Albany, N. Y., and 45 years of age. His body is now at one of the undertaking establishments awaiting final funeral arrangements.

BOYS DOING GREAT WORK

Franco-Americans Capture Guns and Turn Them On Enemy

WITH THE AMERICAN FIRST ARMY, Sept. 27.—Great numbers of prisoners and guns and their mountings were captured in the American sweep in the Argonne region yesterday and today and the captured guns were turned on the Boches. The retiring enemy is setting fire to ammunition dumps. Indications are that the Germans intended to make a standhold in Aire valley between the Aisne and the Meuse. American airplanes "strafed"

German working parties, while the Yankee infantry swept in, capturing the prisoners. Operations were shrouded by a heavy mist.

Have Taken 16,000

Germany Repudiates Course of Malinoff

Berlin Papers Ask That He Be Courtmartialed On Charges of High Treason

LONDON, Sept. 27.—Bulgarian Premier Malinoff has proposed an armistice, it is officially learned through Copenhagen. Berlin learned that the dispatch stated that Malinoff's proposal was not supported by King Ferdinand and other members of the cabinet, and it has caused dissatisfaction throughout the country. A counter movement against the proposal has started in Sofia and strong measures have been taken to support the Bulgarian front.

Malinoff Guilty of Treason?

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 27.—Germany intends to solemnly protest Premier Malinoff's proposal, according to a Berlin dispatch. German newspapers demand the immediate courtmartial of Malinoff on the grounds of high treason. It is believed his offer is due to Germany's refusal to reinforce the Bulgarians in Macedonia.

Austria Rushing Reinforcements

No Surprise in Washington

Government Believes Offer Sincere

DATE POSTPONED

The adjutant general's office in this city has received instruction from Washington authorizing the cancellation of the entrapment to Camp Lewis, scheduled for October 7th. No future date was set.
