LONDON, Oct. 10.—The Allied troops are within two miles of the great German base of Le Cateau. General Haig reported. The British have advanced two miles eastward from Lens and captured Sallaumines and Novelles.

Half Million Huns In Retreat

LONDON, Oct. 10.—The British and French-Americans are advancing between Lens and Moy, along a front of seventy-five miles. British cavalry is now on the outskirts of Le Cateau, according to front dispatches. Twenty miles south of Cambrai the Allies advanced eight miles in the break through the lines. German forces totaling nearly 500,000 are reported retreating toward the Valenciennes lines, fifteen miles to the east, but General Haig announces their resistance is stiffening. The Franco-Americans are reported to be hammering along an eighty-mile front between Berry-au-Bac, northwest of Rheims, and Beaumont, north of Verdun. The Germans are throwing heavy reinforcements into the Kankees' breach in the Kriemhilde line.

Rout Is Imminent

WITH THE BRITISH ARMY IN FRANCE, Oct. 10.—The Germans appear to be on the verge of an utter rout, as the result of the combined blows of the British and Franco-Americans. The Allies have broken through the last Boche organized defenses along the front for a score of miles and are pouring into the open country in the St. Quentin and Cambrai region. The enemy is reported wildly retreating eastward, with the Allied cavalry slashing at their heels and the infantry in the wake of the cavalry. Scores of villages have been taken. Foch Is Planning Huns' Waterloo

Allied Smash Has Seriously Affected Germans, Who Are Feverishly Recruiting Fresh Troops

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—General Foch is striving to bring upon Germany the semblance of a Waterloo. The spectacular Allied smash has already affected the German people seriously, according to government advices and feverish recruiting is underway everywhere in Germany, and workmen are being replaced by prisoners. Military men here foresee that a German retirement will free Northern France and Belgium and they believe it can be accomplished before the winter sets in. They express displeasure at the idea of allowing the German to evacuate, which means that they will be able to haul their armies out without damage. The present West front situation, however, promises heavy German casualties.

CARSON BOY SCOUTS WIN PRESIDENT'S FLAG

The flag is 4x6 feet, made of pure silk, and complete with staff and streamers. On the staff the following inscription appears: "Presented to Troop 1, Boy Scouts of America, Carson City, Nevada, by the President of the United States for distinguished service in aid of the Third Liberty Loan, April, 1918, State of Nevada."
