**GOVERNOR BOYLE'S LABOR RECORD**

Every measure advocated by labor which was passed by the legislature, received Governor Boyle's official approval and thus became a part of the law of the state.

A very considerable number of these reforms were advocated by him in messages to the legislatures which have been in session during his incumbency.

He is and has been on record publicly in favor of:

- The principle of the eight-hour day extending to the fullest possible limits for both men and women.
- The general extension and recognition of the principle of collective bargaining.
- Governmental control as the first step in the direction of governmental ownership of public utilities.
- Assumption by the state of directory power to provide and enforce laws for the proper care and housing of employees of our industries.
- His record will show that the following laws favorable to workers have been enacted with his aid and official approval during the past three and one-half years:
- The law creating the Department of Labor and providing for a Labor Commissioner.
- The Women's Eight-hour day act.
- Law providing for three district Mining Schools and the law providing for the education of adults in Night Schools.
- The so-called "Anti-Spotters" law.
- The "School Teachers' Pension" law.
- The law preventing discrimination against employees running for public office.
- The law regulating employment agencies.
- The law providing for sanitary regulation and Sunday closing of barber shops.
- Corrective amendments of existing laws providing for the safety and care of miners.
- Corrective amendments greatly increasing the liberality of the Workman's Compensation act, including action on his direct recommendation giving the state some measure of control over company hospitals, the enlargement of benefits to those permanently disabled and to dependents in case of death, the creation provision whereby the small operator may properly care for his injured employees, the prohibition of the assessment of men to carry employers' liability, and last but not least, the provision for medical care and attention at the cost of the employer, for men injured in his employ.

**Drastic Clause of Initiative Law**

Most people are of the opinion that if the state is voted "dry" at the November election it means only the closing of the saloons and that they can take their little old jug to the grocery and have it filled at their pleasure. For the benefit of those who are laboring under this delusion their attention is called to section 7 of the initiative petition to be voted on, which reads as follows:

Sec. 7. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or have FOR PERSONAL USE or otherwise, or to use, or permit another to have, keep or use, intoxicating liquors at any restaurant, store, office building, club, place where soft drinks are sold (except a drug store may have and sell alcohol and wine as provided by sections four and twenty-four), fruit stand, newsstand, room or place where bowling alleys, billiard or pool tables are maintained, livery stables, public buildings, park, road, street or alley. It shall be unlawful for any person to give or furnish to another intoxicating liquors. Anyone violating this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one hundred dollars, nor more than one thousand dollars, and be imprisoned in the county jail not less than two nor more than twelve months; provided that no common carrier, for hire, nor any other person, for hire or without hire, shall bring or carry into this state, or carry from one place to another within the state, intoxicating liquors for another, even when intended for personal use; except a common carrier may, for hire, carry pure grain alcohol and wine, and such preparations as may be sold by druggists for the special purposes and in the manner as set forth in sections four and twenty-four; and provided further, however, that in case of search and seizure, the finding of any liquors shall be prima facie evidence that the same are being kept and stored for unlawful purposes.
