**IMPROVED CONDITION AT VIRGINIA CITY**

It is welcome health news today on the Comstock, there having been no further new cases of the Spanish influenza to develop up till noon today, which is good evidence that the disease now is receding. Health reports show that since the epidemic first started in this city there have been 140 cases of the influenza, but there has been a steady decline for the past several days, until none has developed for the past thirty-six hours.  
Reports from the afflicted ones throughout the city is on the whole encouraging today, but the condition of County Commissioner Charles E. Kiblinger, ill with pneumonia in Gold Hill, remains critical, he being about the same.  
Ernest Lamerton, who was very ill yesterday, is improved today, and Mrs. Andresen is also much better. All other cases were distinctly favorable today.

At the home of Judge F. P. Langan, where six members of the family are down with the flu, all are doing nicely today and rapidly improving.—Chronicle.
