GERMAN SCHOOL CHILDREN BECOMING UNRULY

A recently published report of the United States Bureau of Education makes the following statement:

"Owing to the lack of proper surveillance, as well as to certain psychological causes, school children in Germany have become, during the war, unusually mischievous and unruly. This condition has been reported to the German educational men by various localities, and in some districts remedial measures of considerable severity have already been taken."

In Berlin school authorities have requested that orders be given to the police and other guardians of law and order to take energetic measures on their own initiative against all shamelessness, mischief, and roughness on the part of children. The resolution adopted by the Berlin school authorities reads: "In view of the fact that numerous cases, mentioned at this meeting, have proved that the behavior of school children is becoming increasingly bad, we request that orders shall be given to prevent any restriction of the lawful right of punishment which belongs to the teacher, and to see that the school police intervene much more speedily and energetically."

"ONCE OVERS"

You say you are not a fighting man, but if anyone should start a harmful story about you, you would be ready to pummel him on sight.

And at the same time you are doing this very thing concerning other men, and it is not unlikely that you have circulated stories about men who are cleaner at heart than you are.

LIVING CONDITIONS IN OCCUPIED BELGIUM

Since the high cost of living is engaging the attention of nearly every person in the United States, the following passages from a private letter, a copy of which has been received by the Belgium High Commission of the United States, from Malines, in the occupied portion of Belgium, have a special interest.

"We are all well. We have told you about the heightened cost of living, but what will you say to this: Butter, 22 francs (\$4.40) a kilo (2.2) pounds; meat, 14 francs (\$2.80); bacon, 21 francs (\$4.20); eggs, 1 franc, 10 centimes (22 cents) apiece; coal, 150 francs (\$30) for 100 kilos.

The students of the college and university come to class in wooden shoes; women and girls as well. Men's sabots cost 7 francs, 50 centimes (\$1.90); before the war they sold for 1 franc, 10 centimes and 90 centimes, respectively (22 cents and 18 cents). A pair of

socks costs 20 francs (\$4); a small spool of thread, 5 francs, 50 centimes (\$1.10). A bag of potatoes, 125 francs (\$25).

"Just now we sleep on straw, as all the mattresses have been requisitioned.

"The new chapel of the parish of St. Rombaut is almost finished. Mgr. Mercier is coming to dedicate it. It is all rebuilt and is more beautiful and bigger than it was before.

"The trams are not running any more. At night we get along by light of a candle, costing 1 franc (20 cents). Before the war it cost 10 centimes (2 cents).

PRO-GERMANS DEFINED

In the same measure that we—as a nation—have been all too lenient in our treatment of those alien enemies whom we catch red-handed acting as spies for the imperial kaiser of hell, so are we also disposed to thoughtlessly underestimate the seriousness of the condition which we are pleased to call—"Pro-German."

He is in-sympathy with the German methods of warfare.
He believes in the torture of little children.
He believes in the crucifixion of women.
He believes in the emasculation of prisoners of war.
He believes in wholesale rape.—The Gulf Coast Lumberman.
