Harry James, one of the best known residents of this city, yesterday afternoon filed for the Democratic nomination for sheriff of Ormsby county.

L. F. Haber, Ed Herschel and George Howell, mining men of San Francisco, Piedmont and Oakland, respectively, were arrivals in this city yesterday afternoon, and this morning, piloted by Will Casson, they departed for Schurz to look at mining interests there.

Ira MacFarland, who has been at Illipah in charge of oil development there, was a visitor in this city today. Mr. MacFarland says that the big well in that section is now down 520 feet and will be sunk considerably deeper as soon as new drilling tools arrive. These are expected every day.

Dufferin." The defender, the "Madelaine," defeated the challenger.

Canada tried again in 1881, when the Bay of Quinta Club of Ontario sent down the sloop "Atlanta" and she was in turn beaten by the "Mischieff."

Four years elapsed and the matches were resumed with a series of annual races starting in 1885.

The defender "Puritan" defeated the "Genesta" in 1885, and the challenger "Galeta" was beaten by the defender "Mayflower" in 1886. The following year the defender "Volunteer" again won against the "Thistle."

In 1893 Lord Dunraven set out to bring the cup back to England. He sent over the "Valkyrie II." The cup was defended successfully by "Vigilant," the first of the line of Herreshoff sloops, which are represented again this year by "Resolute," the defender.

Dunraven tried his luck again in 1895 with "Valkyrie III." The first race of the series was won by the "Defender" in a light wind. In the second race "Defender" was fouled by the challenger and lost the race with a broken wing. A protest was lodged on the grounds of a foul and when the yacht club sustained the protest, Dunraven withdrew in anger and refused to continue.

When Dunraven gave up his ambition to win the cup, Sir Thomas Lipton, perhaps the most romantic figure in the history of the cup races, took up the task and is still at it to this day.

The first of his family of "Shamrock" appeared in 1899, but she was defeated by "Columbia" in three straight races.

"Shamrock II" came back in 1901 to meet a sloop built and designed by Herreshoff, the "Constitution." But she failed to make good in the trials and "Columbia" was sent out again to meet the challenger. She defended the cup successfully, winning by a margin of one victory, helped by the time handicap which the Lipton yacht was forced to concede.

In 1903, "Shamrock III" was brought over by Lipton. The "Reliance" was chosen as the defender and she demonstrated her superiority over the challenger in a decisive manner.

In 1914, "Shamrock IV," this year's challenger, was the challenger. She was on the water when war was declared and had to travel 1,000 miles out of her course to dodge submarines. Upon her arrival here she was hauled out and placed in a hermetically sealed enclosure where she remained for five years, narrowly missing destruction by a fire at the Jacobs shipyards early this spring.

The New York Yacht Club in 1914 had built three sloops to fight for the honor of defending the cup.

The "Resolute," a Herreshoff boat; "Vanitie," designed by William Gardner, and "Defiance," designed by George Owen, met in a series of trial races which determined the unfitness of "Defiance" and left the committee in doubt as to "Resolute" and "Vanitie." Despite the fact that "Resolute" beat "Vanitie" in the majority of the trials, the committee was not convinced that the former was the better sloop.

In the trial races this summer, "Resolute" again defeated "Vanitie" in the trials and she was finally named as the defender.

This brings the history of the races up to the present time and makes the way clear for the next chapter, the races off Sandy Hook starting tomorrow between "Shamrock IV" and "Resolute," the fourteenth time the "America's Cup" has been fought for.

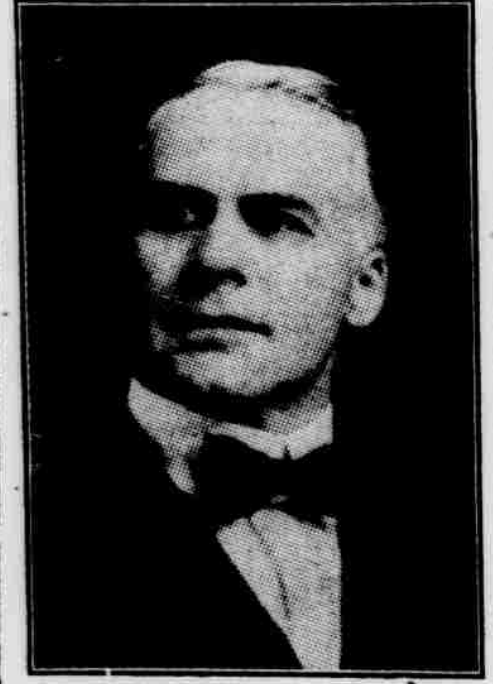
