

## A PASSING REVIEW

To all appearances Reno is going to the great battle ground for the Republican state and federal candidates in the coming primary election fight. In the last three or four days preceding the primary election they will all be in the riverside city, it has been announced, but even right now many of them are on hand to remain until the poles close. Those prominent on the streets and in the hotel lobbies these days are John Miller, Charlie Chandler, Grant Miller, former State Senator Griffith, Pete Buol, Harry Atkinson, Alex Tannahill, and A. L. Haight.

Sam Platt left during the middle of the week for a hurricane tour of the state. He will visit only the large towns, however, and endeavor to rearrange the fences which he constructed in his two previous senatorial campaigns. He is confident, though he came in at a late day, that he will capture the Republican senatorial nomination and there are many well up in party affairs who incline to the same belief. Buol's supporters still insist though that their man has the inside and they give good reasons for holding such an opinion. Arentz seems to be the puzzle in the controversy, and what kind of a vote he is going to poll worries many of the politicians. He is strong in a number of the Reno precincts and also in many of the outlying sections, but what all this amounts to in the aggregate is hard to figure out.

"Jimmy" Boyd left Wednesday night for Elko and other towns in the eastern part of the state. Before returning to western Nevada he will make a trip down through Lincoln and Clark counties and thence to Goldfield and Tonopah. Tuesday night he was at Fallon and spoke from the same platform with his opponent, Colonel Scrugham. The latter addressed the Lion's club at a luncheon given in Reno Thursday and went into detail relative to the state's water situation.

The three busiest Democratic candidates in the state today are Archie Cross, Senator Huskey, and Charles Richards, all seeking the congressional nomination. The former is in the southern section, and the two latter are working the middle and eastern counties of the state. It is going to be a battle-royal between these three, with the chances apparently even.

The prelude to the big entertainment planned for November is about completed and the curtain will be brought down in ten more days to permit those who have not been given the hook to prepare for the headliner.

A glance at the primary ballots shows that Republican voters of Ormsby county will be permitted to vote on nine contests, while the Democrats will participate in only six.

That John H. Miller has in mind the possibility that he will not be the next governor of Nevada and that he will want to retain his seat in the state senate is evident from the fact that he has not resigned the senatorship.

Let the Sparks Tribune tell the story: "Some discussion has started down in Mineral county and is spreading over the state concerning the attitude of

J. H. Miller, seeking the Republican gubernatorial nomination has assumed regarding the office he holds at this time.

"Mr Miller is the holdover senator from Mineral, his term not expiring for two years. It was thought by a great many that he would resign this office prior to the time limit set for filing and that the people of that county would have the opportunity of filling the office at election.

"The fact that Miller did not resign has brought about a pretty situation. Many claim that the reason for not resigning is the fact that Miller and his advisers do not consider the chances of electing a Republican governor to be any too good, and they advised him to hold the place in the senate and keep the vote in the Republican party. Others who have taken note of the situation declare that the fact that Miller has not resigned is part of a plan to deprive the people of Mineral county of the opportunity of electing a senator in the event that Miller should secure the election to the governorship. They point to the fact that the constitutional amendment permitting county commissioners to fill vacancies in the legislative offices will this year be voted upon by the people. As soon as the vote is ratified by the supreme court the law becomes in full force and effect.

"The question was smoldering prior to August 5, but since that time it has gained greater momentum and promises to develop into a real sized flame before many weeks have passed. It has particularly aroused many Republicans as they profess to see chances of Miller winning the governorship and claim that it is a political scheme to deprive them of the opportunity to elect a senator from their county.

"Another feature of the proposition is the claim that the new amendment will not be effective this year and if Miller is elected, Mineral county will be forced to hold a special election to fill his place in the senate."

The constitutional amendment is as follows:

In case of the death or resignation of any member of the legislature, either senator or assemblyman, the county commissioners of the county from which such member was elected shall appoint a person of the same political party as the party which elected such senator or assemblyman to fill such vacancy; provided, that this section shall apply only in cases where no general election takes place between the time of such death or resignation and the next succeeding session of the legislature.

Dressed in a blue suit and grey hat, she carried a bouquet of red roses given her by the rodeo association.

Upon her arrival in the capital on Monday she will be met by Senator and Mrs. Oddie at whose home she will be a guest for the rest of the week, before her return to Nevada.
