

COAST ITEMS.

Pasadena wants an ice factory. Benicia has a fifteen-year old girl burglar. The otter is being hunted out of Washington State.

An experimental olive-oil mill has been erected at Pomona. Salmon are running up the Russian river in large numbers.

An extra session of the Idaho Legislature will probably be called. The employees of the electric-car system at Sacramento are forming a union.

Oil found near Pismo, San Luis Obispo county, has caused much excitement.

Three boys at Shasta have been fined \$10 a piece for snowballing a young man.

Dr. Milne and others of Victoria, B. C., are shipping prize poultry to the Seattle exhibition.

Frank E. Hill, a young druggist, will have to answer at San Bernardino to the charge of bigamy.

Two weeks' wages to the crew engaged in the attempt to raise the San Pedro amounted to \$8,300.

Figures are published showing that the raisin crop of California this year has been 2,500,000 boxes.

A new coal washer has been erected at the Wellington mines for washing out the dross, thus saving 65 per cent. of the coal.

The Nez Perce Indians want to be removed from the Colville Reservation to their old home in the Blue Mountains of Washington.

All the bars of Victoria, B. C., were closed Sunday except that of the Dallas Hotel which remained open for guests, with a view of making a test case.

Young Ritchie, aged fourteen years, who attempted to kill his mother with a butcher knife at Salinas a short time ago, has been taken to the Whittier Reform School.

Saturday night, about 12 o'clock, six Chinamen entered the wash-house of Pon Lin in Martinez, and abducted Lin Oy, a young Chinese girl who was recently married to You Tai.

The Salt Lake and Ogden Railroad Company has filed articles of incorporation. The road will run from Salt Lake City to Ogden and the survey includes Utah City and Garfield Beach the popular summer resorts.

Chief Joshua Sitwell, last of the great chiefs of the Puyallups, died yesterday, aged eighty years. He was always friendly to the whites and did the early settlers many friendly acts during the Indian wars on Puget Sound.

The sealing schooner Beatrice, forty-nine tons, owned at Vancouver, B. C., has sailed on a sealing cruise. She will sail south to about San Diego, where the seals appear, and work up north. She is the first of the British Columbia fleet.

Jesus Arviso, charged with robbing the mails, last April, between Bowie and Solomonville, A. T., has been sentenced to ten years in San Quentin, Cal. Arviso is the last of a gang who monthly robbed stages and the mail in Southern Arizona.

A man aged about thirty years was found dead near the Donohue Railroad depot at San Rafael Thursday. There was a bullet hole in his head. No further knowledge has been obtained, except that evidences point to a murder having been committed.

The divorce case of Yda Addis Storke, the brilliant but somewhat erratic newspaper writer, against C. A. Storke, a prominent lawyer of Santa Barbara, is now on trial there. He charges his wife is a morphine user and drinks. She alleges cruelty.

Before the Sacramento Board of Supervisors Wednesday a letter from John Doherty, a civil engineer of Oakland, was read, in which it was stated that the building of the levee past Washington, on the Yolo side of the river, will cause Sacramento to be flooded.

The Oregon Board of Railroad Commissioners finds that the railroad accident on the Union Pacific, near La Grande, December 29th, in which three persons were killed, was due to the negligence of the company. The Board says the engine was not suited to the track.

F. L. Patterson, who posed as a special Government Agent, in the Postal Service, was caught at Butte, Mont., yesterday, in the act of stealing money from the ordinary mail. Complaints have of late been frequent about missing letters containing money. Patterson was to leave the city yesterday, and, while bidding the Postoffice employees good-bye, Inspector Watkins told the Postmaster to look in Patterson's left shoe, which he did, and found a letter containing \$20. Patterson's friends immediately bailed him out on \$1,000 each.
