Subject to the decision of the National Republican Convention.

A correspondent of the Ohio State Journal called on Senator-elect Payne the other day, and asked him whether he was a candidate for the Presidency, and received for answer, "I have nothing to say," which the correspondent interpreted to mean: "I am." When questioned regarding the statement of his son, O. H. Payne, that he is not a candidate, he said: "We are two separate and independent persons, you know. I am not responsible for any thing he says."

A serious railroad accident occurred last Friday night on the Pan-Handle about three miles west of Xenia. An express train running at the rate of forty-five miles an hour, was thrown from the track by a misplaced rail, near a bridge over the Little Miami, and narrowly escaped being thrown into the river. The engineer, John Thomas of Xenia, was instantly killed, and the fireman, John McConnell of the same place, fatally injured, and the express messenger and baggage master so seriously injured that their recovery is doubtful. None of the passengers were killed but several had limbs fractured and received severe bruises. The accident was no doubt caused by some fiend purposely misplacing the track in order to wreck the train and rob the passengers.

Adjournment of the Legislature.

The "Standard Oil" Legislature closed its first session last Monday, and adjourned to the first Monday in January, 1885. As it began its work by a bargain and sale of the U. S. Senatorship to the Standard Oil Company, so one of its last acts was to signalize its ownership by that giant monopoly by the defeat of the Kohler Pipe Line bill, a measure intended to give other coal oil companies an equal chance with the Standard Oil concern and force it to relax its grasp upon the pockets of the people. Mr. Kohler's bill passed the House on Thursday, the Republicans voting solidly for it, aided by enough honest Democrats to secure its passage. The bill was then sent to the Senate, where it was pocketed by the President pro tem, Mr. White, of Defiance, who resisted all attempts of the friends of the bill to get it before the Senate until too late to secure its passage, as Monday morning had been set for final adjournment. A more outrageous and high-handed usurpation of power on the part of a presiding officer has never been recorded in the annals of the Ohio Legislature.

The graded liquor tax bill was killed in the House by the determined opposition of Allen O. Myers and other Democrats, and the Scott Law as amended in the House, passed the Senate on Saturday. The only changes in the law made by the House are the striking out of the McConnellville ordinance section, the adoption of a clause making the payment of the tax semi-annual instead of annual, another refunding the tax *pro rata* if a saloon keeper retires from business before the year is out, and lastly that in case of removal during the year shall not be required to pay the tax again.

A joint resolution passed the Senate to submit a constitutional amendment to the people next year, for a graded license law, but it failed to pass the House and was referred to the Judiciary committee to be reported on at the next session.

The Judicial bill to establish the new Circuit Courts, became a law.

A joint resolution passed both houses for an investigation of the alleged frauds in Cincinnati at the spring elections, and at previous elections as far back as the committee choose to go. Allen O. Myers was the author of the resolution and will doubtless be chairman of the committee.

Recent estimates made in the Post-Office department indicate that the reduction of letter postage will not cause any very serious reduction in the revenue for the current fiscal year ending June 30, the estimated falling off being only about two millions as compared with last year.

### Report of the State Relief Commission.

In the Senate last Friday Senator Reed of this district submitted the report of the State Relief Commission:

"To the Governor and the General Assembly of the State.

"We, the undersigned, members of the Ohio State Relief Commission, respectfully represents that there now remains in the State Treasury the sum of \$100,000 to the credit of the Ohio State Relief Commission.

"We further represent that the Commission has now on hand, unappropriated, the sum of \$4,952.50.

"We further represent that such measure of relief as is yet to be extended to the citizens of this State who suffered by the recent flood, as the majority of the members of this commission have decided to be within the scope and interest of 'substitute for Senate Bill No. 76, and joint resolution No. 27,' passed by the Legislature February 15, 1884, will, in our opinion, be covered by the above mentioned \$4,952.50.

"We, therefore, respectfully request that the honorable Legislature of this State take such action in the premises as in its judgment may seem proper.
