## GATLING GUN

### Helped Bring a Desperado Family to Terms.

Vicksburg, Miss., Oct. 21.—Sheriff Brennan and a strong posse, reinforced by a gatling gun squad from the Warren light artillery, have captured the Hull family, consisting of father, W. C. Hull, son R. W. Hull, and daughter, Mrs. Allie Vaughan, wanted in Arkansas for shooting the sheriff and several deputies at Sterling, Saturday afternoon. The Hulls, who are from Evansville, Ind., surrendered without firing a shot and are now in the county jail. Sheriff Brennan and posse, after guarding the river banks all night, received word at noon Sunday, that the pirates had entered the Yazoo river. As quickly as possible the tug Joe Seay was prepared for the pursuit, with the gatling gun as a forward battery. Two miles up the Yazoo the Hull's trading boat, the Hazel, was found tied to the bank. When the Vicksburg tug approached, the woman hailed, and stated that if the Vicksburg officers were aboard to blow their whistles, and the men, who had taken to the woods, would surrender. This was done, and soon the men put out from the east bank in a skiff.

### Made George How Famous

### A Remarkable Prisoner Is Dead.

### Bold Work Brought Him a 10-Year Sentence.

Columbus, O., Oct. 21.—George How, probably the most noted prisoner in the Ohio penitentiary, died yesterday. How was serving a sentence of ten years from Adams county for the forging of an order for 25 cents' worth of tobacco. His career after his arrest was what made him famous. He was the first prisoner incarcerated in a new jail. One hundred dollars had been offered to any prisoner who would escape. How was in jail just 24 hours when he escaped. The Sheriff pursued him with bloodhounds. How made friends with the dogs, stole them and sold them to a farmer. He stole and sold the laprobe and cushion from the Sheriff's buggy. He was chased into Michigan and when recaptured claimed the \$100 for breaking out of the new jail. He was refused it and brought suit against the county, but lost his case. His actions so incensed the officials that he was given the limit of the law.

## FOOD STUFFS FROM CANADA

### May Be Supplied in Great Britain at Low Prices.

London, Oct. 21.—The Westminster Gazette states that a great Canadian trust is being formed, headed by Earl of Aberdeen and Lord Balfour of Burleigh, for the purpose of supplying Canadian food stuffs for the British market at 20 to 75 cents below the present prices, and importing to England Canadian manufactures. The trust, according to the Gazette, will open retail shops in all of the principal cities

and towns of Great Britain, and expects to do business on an enormous scale. Mr. Nurey, former deputy minister of agriculture of Manitoba province, the paper asserts, is the originator of the scheme and is now in Canada arranging the details. The public will shortly be invited to subscribe to the capital.

## PROTECT BIRDS.

### Audubon Society of New York is Getting Busy.

New York, October 21.—What promises to be a lively campaign on the part of the Audubon society of New York state against the illegal traffic in birds and their plumage has been declared open at the annual meeting of the society in this city. At the close of an illustrated address on "The Present Demand for Birds for Millinery Purposes and What the Audubon Society Proposes to do About It," Wm. Dutcher, of the executive board, read a statement addressed to dealers in birds and their plumage in which after rehearsing the state and federal laws relating to the protection of non-game birds the society warned dealers of its intention to prosecute all violators of the law. Three thousand copies of this statement, which is signed by Morris K. Jesup, president; Frank M. Chapman, chairman of the executive committee, and William Dutcher, chairman of the committee on laws, have been printed and will be sent to dealers, audubon societies and persons and organizations interested in ornithology.
