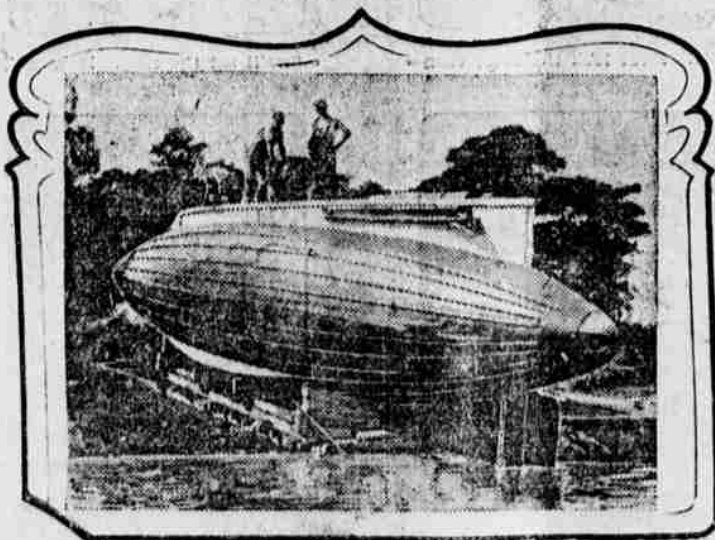
## RALLY DAY.
