MANAGEMENT TO THE PARTY OF THE MORE REBELS TO WHIP.

A Strong Force Entrenched at Bacolor.

Upon Kansas Camp-The Americans Apparently Enjoying Life.

MANUA, May 8 .- The next task of the Americans will probably be to clear the Filinmos out of Bacolor, about five miles southwest of San Fernando. The rebel General Mascardo has a force of 5,000 men there, well armed and possessed of pignty of anumanition. His troops have never met American soldies, and they think, according to reperis carried to San Fernando, that they in "whip the whole lot."

Bacolor is well entrenched, and thou sands of natives are werking like beavers, digging trenches and carrying the dirt in baskets. The enemy uses his riflemen for fighting only, but compels the bolomen and Chinese, and even the women, to labor incessantly.

The rebels have an outpost about a mile beyond San Fernando, with a trench that holds between 200 and 300 men. From that point several volleys were fired last night upon the camp of the Twentieth Kansas regiment, Neither General MacArthur or Gen-

eral Lawton moved Sunday, although each reconnectered the country in his own vicinity for some miles from headquarters, developing the presence of small forces of the enemy.

In the vicinity of Luguna de Bay the rebels are extremely active, but the lines of General Ovenshine and Colonel Wholley who is commanding General King's brigade during the latter's illhave been materially strengthened, and there is no danger in that di-

The armed steamers Laguna de Bay and Cavadouga, under Captain Grant, have gone to Guagua, about five miles large factory at that point. sonthwest of Bacolor, presumably to establish a a base of supplies for the troops engaged in the northern campaign.

It is rumored that Mabini, president of the cabinet, and minister of foreign affairs in the se-called Filipino govern ment, who is a radical, is to be suc-ceeded by Paterno, the framer of the Spanish treaty of 1896. This change is regarded as significant at the present juncture.

The entrance of the Americans into San Fernando was virtually unopposed. The Filipinos, who expected the in vaders to approach from the sea, had that side of the town strongly guarded, but there was only one line of trenches beyond San Tomas. Two battalion of the Fifty-first Iowa regiment, which swam the river north of the city, were smartly peppered while in the water, but the rebels disappeared as soon as the Americans reached the shore. In the meaatime the hospital squad had walked across the bridge into the city, supposing the Americans were there They encountered no natives.

The few Spaniards and Filipinos who were left welcomed the Americans and opened their bouses to them, General Mac Arthur accepting entertainment at the hands of Senor Hizon, a sugar

If the inhabitants of the San Fernando region are to be believed, there was little sympathy with the insurrection in that quarter. Before evacuating the city the rebels barned the church and the public buildings and looted the Chinese quarter. They drove many rich Filipinos, with their families, out of the city before them, as well as hundreds of Chinese, to prevent them helping the They cut the throats of Americans. some. Many Chinese hid on roof tons or in cellars, and some escaped by cut-

ting off their queues. There were 50 fresh graves in the churchyard. The country beyond Calumpit was full of all sorts of ingenius trenches and pitfalls in the roads, with sharpened bamboo. Fortunately the Americans escaped the latter.
