CITY OFFICERS.

The Republicans of the City of Marietta are hereby notified that a convention of the qualified electors of the Republican party will be held at Hagan & Schad's Hall, on Third street, in said city, on

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 19TH, 1901, At seven (7) o'clock, P. M., for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the following offices:

One City Commissioner.
One Water Works Trustee.
One Cemetery Trustee.

Said convention shall be composed of delegates to be chosen at primary elections held in each ward of said city on

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY, 16TH, 1901. Between the hours of five o'clock P. M., and seven o'clock, P. M. The apportionment of said delegates shall be one delegate for each twenty-five votes or fraction of thirteen votes cast at the next preceding election for the Republican candidate for Mayor. The number of delegates shall be:

Fifth Ward..... 6
Sixth Ward..... 6

Total..... 54
Nominations for the various offices shall be made in the order given above and a majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to nominate any candidate.

The Republican electors of the several wards are further notified that at the same time and places at which the delegates are chosen to said convention, one candidate for Member of the City Council and one candidate for Assessor are also to be chosen for each ward respectively, and the names of such candidates shall be certified to said convention with the credentials of the delegates thereto, and also certified to the Board of Deputy State Supervisors of Elections.

DIVORCE RULING

Abusers of Cigarettes are Placed With Excessive Liquor Users.

Oshkosh, Wis.—The case of Mrs. Beatrice Tracey, upon whose allegation that her husband smoked cigarettes to excess a decree of divorce was granted by Judge Burnell, of the Winnebago County Circuit Court, has attracted considerable interest in this State. Holla Tracey is closely related to some of the wealthiest and oldest families of the city. While Mrs. Tracey is now only 29 years old, she has been married seven years, the couple having eluded opposition to their marriage by running away.

Mrs. Tracey, in her petition, avers that her husband smoked cigarettes night and day, and that continual indulgence in this habit had so unfitted him for business that he had for four years failed utterly in the matter of supporting her. It had also, she declared, rendered him practically a maniac.

Judge Burnell said today that divorces have to be granted upon statutory grounds, and that, while cigarette smoking is not enumerated among these grounds, excessive drinking is, and the effect on the moral condition of the man is much the same in both cases.

ON HIS DEATH BED

Explained a Passage of Scripture to His Daughter.

Chambersburg, Pa.—Most of the funeral arrangements of the Rev. John Fohl had been made by him as he lay dying. He chose the singers, those who should act as pallbearers, the preacher to conduct the services and even the text for the funeral sermon.

His last words were in explanation of a verse of Scripture about which his daughter, Mrs. Susan Hotchkiss, of Cheshire, Conn., had questioned him a few days ago. Early in the morning on the day he died Mrs. Hotchkiss was awakened by her father's voice. She ran to his room and heard him repeating the verse. When he saw her he began a discourse on the text, but the words died away as he became unconscious. In a short time his senses returned, and he continued his sermon, only to be interrupted again by the failing of his faculties, and this alternation continued until his death.

The Rev. Mr. Fohl was born in 1815, and was the oldest minister of the United Brethren faith in Pennsylvania. He was a man of great strength of character and highly esteemed by those who knew him best.

MOHAMMEDANS

Appear in Pekin to Cause Disturbances During Celebrations.

Pekin, Feb. 9.—The foreign envoys met this morning to consider the edict presented by the Chinese plenipotentiaries regarding the suspension of examinations for five years and also the punishment of officials guilty of not having suppressed outrages upon foreigners. They objected to the wording of the edict which made it seem that troubles were entirely due to the actions of native Christians. While satisfactory in other respects, it was altered to suit the views of the envoys and then returned to the Chinese plenipotentiaries.

It is reliably reported that more than 20,000 Mohammedans have re-appeared in Pekin with the object of creating disturbances during the Chinese celebrations at New Years. The Germans have accordingly issued orders to their troops.

COST OF WAR

Levy Wants Statement of it Sent to Cuban Convention.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 9.—Representative Levy, of New York, introduced a resolution in the House authorizing the President to appoint a commission to ascertain the actual amount of money expended by the United States in the prosecution of the war with Spain to secure the freedom and independence of Cuba, including probable pension payments.

The Commission shall report what proportion of this total amount shall be borne by Cuba, to the President, who is directed to communicate to the Constitutional Convention of Cuba, with the suggestion that it is regarded by the United States as a claim against Cuba.
