After reciting the teachings of the Mormon church at length, the judge said: "It has always been and still is the policy of this government to encourage aliens who in good faith come to reside in this country to become citizens."

The Judge's decision should meet with the hearty approval of every true citizen of the United States. A majority of these people may be acting in good faith, but as time rolls on they should take measures to seek sufficient light to enable them to become law abiding citizens to the government in which they live.
