

ALUM BAKING POWDERS.

Active Measures Against Them by the Ohio State Authorities.

The Ohio State Dairy and Food Commission has published the following notifications:

"The use of alum in baking powder is considered deleterious—not healthy. Hence, the use of this mineral is prohibited in the manufacture of baking powder."

"Baking powder that contains alum is not a fit article of consumption. Parties selling or manufacturing such baking powder will be liable to arrest for selling an article that is considered deleterious to health."

The Commission has published the names of baking powders found by analysis to be made from alum as follows:

Washington Letter.

(From our Regular Correspondent.)

WASHINGTON, April 5, 1889.

The President is at last getting a little breathing time, now that the Senate has adjourned and the office seekers have been notified that he proposes to take his own time in making the rest of the appointments. The total number of appointments to date is slightly in advance of the number made by Pres. Cleveland during the same time.

I have it on excellent authority that the rejection of the nomination of Murat Halsted to be Minister to Germany by the Senate will not prevent that gentleman's being sent there. The President, according to my informant, believes that by next December those Republican Senators who for personal reasons voted against the confirmation of Mr. Halsted's nomination, will have seen the mistake they made and be prepared to confirm him.

All this, however, is merely the opinion of some who think they know, while there are others who say Mr. Halsted would never accept the appointment under such circumstances.

Before adjourning the Senate confirmed nearly all the nominations made by the President. Among the few unacted upon were those of E. I. Kersebaud to be U. S. Marshal for the Eastern District of Louisiana, and W. H. Whitman to be Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of New Mexico.

The first State reception of the present administration took place on Tuesday evening. It was held in honor of the Prince and Princess Takahito, of Japan, who are making a tour of America. The following was the receiving party: The President and Mrs. Harrison, Secretary Proctor and Mrs. Blaine, Secretary Blaine and Mrs. Windom, Secretary Tracy and Mrs. Wilmerding, Secretary and Mrs. Rusk, Dr. Scott and Mrs. Scott Lord, sister and sister of Mrs. Harrison, Mr. and Mrs. McKee, Mr. and Mrs. Russell Harrison, Miss Margaret Blaine and Miss Mason, Secretary Halford and Miss Lina McKee.

A delegation from Brooklyn (N. Y.) G. A. R. men called on the President this week and presented him with a resolution of thanks adopted by all the Posts of that city, for the appointment of Corporal Tanner as Commissioner of Pensions.

Considerable comment was caused here by the action of the Senate on the day of its adjournment in regard to a resolution of Senator Stewart's expressing the sorrow of the Senate at the death of the illustrious English Statesman, John Bright. Everybody thought the resolution would be passed unanimously, as this country was under deep and lasting obligations to Mr. Bright for the fearless manner in which he stood by the Union during the rebellion. Great therefore was the surprise when it was decided to refer the resolution to the committee on foreign affairs, on the ground that its adoption might establish a precedent which would possibly make trouble in the future.

DIED.

WARREN—Of paralysis, after sixteen weeks suffering at her home, Saturday, April 6, Mrs. Laura Wait Warren, aged 75 years and 2 months. Funeral Monday afternoon at 1 o'clock, Rev. W. C. Dawson, officiating, and her remains were interred in the new cemetery by the side of her husband who preceded her just eight weeks.

Laura Wait was born in Fredonia in the State of New York, February 6, 1814. She had three brothers and three sisters all of whom she survived. In her childhood she moved with her parents to Charlotte, New York, where Sept. 21st, 1831, she was married to Luther Day Warren whose death preceded her's eight weeks. For more than forty-seven years they traveled life's journey hand in hand. "The love that cheers life's latest stage, proof against sickness and old age," was truly theirs.

Obituary.

James Rust was born November 10th, 1824 in Westmoreland, Onelda county, N. Y. When he was six years of age, he came with his mother to Brighton, O. Early in life, at the age of twelve, he was thrown upon his own resources and was indeed a self made man.

He attended his first course of medical lectures at the Western Reserve College in Cleveland, Ohio, in 1852. After finishing this course of lectures he purchased a stock of drugs and opened a store in Wellington, O. In 1863 he disposed of his drug store and again entered medical college to complete his professional studies graduating from the Cleveland Homeopathic College in 1864.

After graduating he at once began the practice of medicine in Wellington, where he has ever since been actively engaged in professional work. During this time he was seldom ill and his sudden death was a surprise and shock to the whole community. An untimely exposure resulted in pneumonia, and although every thing was done for him that was possible, he lived but six days after the invasion of the dread disease.

A more peaceful and beautiful death than his could not be experienced. Loath to leave his family and friends he was nevertheless, willing and happy to answer the summons of the Master. He was not afraid to go. Death to him had no sting and he felt that he was going to dwell in a place prepared for him.

In his death the family lose a kind husband and an indulgent father. The community has lost a skillful and true physician and a loyal citizen who will be missed more and more as time goes on. May we follow in his footsteps and "So live, that when our summons comes to join The innumerable caravan, which moves To that mysterious realm, where each shall take His chamber in the silent halls of death."

We may "approach our grave Like one who wraps the drapery of his couch About him and lies down to pleasant dreams."
