

SENSATIONAL CHARGES.

Serious Accusations Preferred Against the Officials of the Recamier Manufacturing Company by Mrs. Harriet Hubbard Ayer.

New York, May 21.—Mrs. Harriet Hubbard Ayer has brought suit against the Recamier Manufacturing Company and its officials, including the banker, James M. Seymour, who is treasurer; also her daughter, Harriet, who is the wife of Seymour's son, alleging that they conspired to defraud her of her majority interest in the stock of the company for which she had given value in the shape of receipts.

STEAMER BURNED. A Fine Boat Destroyed in the Harbor of Baltimore.

Baltimore, Md., May 21.—The steamship Johns Hopkins was burned last night. Fire was discovered in the hold of the vessel shortly before midnight, while she was lying at pier No. 6. She was immediately towed out into and down the stream to Fort McHenry. The city fire department responded promptly to the alarm, but were prevented from going to the steamship by the military authorities at the fort.

ONCE MORE A BRIDE. Mrs. Folsom, Mother of Mrs. Grover Cleveland, Weds a Well-Known Citizen of Buffalo.

JACKSON, Mich., May 21.—The wedding of Mr. H. E. Perrine and Mrs. Emma C. Folsom, mother of Mrs. Grover Cleveland, was solemnized at nine o'clock last evening, Rev. R. B. Balcom, of St. Paul's Episcopal Church officiating. The bride was attired in her traveling costume. The guests present included Mrs. Cleveland and the family of Mrs. Cadman, aunt of the bride.

Embosered \$18,000. BOERVON, May 21.—William D. Derby, cashier of the Mutual District Messenger Company, is now under arrest at police headquarters on the charge of embezzling \$18,000 from the Western Union Telegraph Company.

Taken From Jail and Lynched. CAIRO, Ill., May 21.—Joe Thornton, a negro prisoner in the Workhouse, Ky., jail was lynched yesterday morning. Thornton had assaulted a little girl, and attempts to strangle him up were made last Wednesday and Thursday. At two o'clock a masked mob overpowered the jailer and dragged the negro to a slaughter house on the outskirts of the town, where a noose was fixed around his neck and the end of the rope thrown over the snatch block. Thornton was left to strangle and was found dead by the butcher at daylight.

Monument Dedicated. GREENSBORO, Pa., May 21.—Battery I, First New York Artillery, yesterday dedicated a massive granite monument on East Cemetery Hill, where during the battle they had a hand to hand struggle with the Louisiana Tigers. The veterans and friends from Buffalo, N. Y., numbered fifty. Hon. John M. Farquhar, member of Congress from Buffalo, was orator of the day, Cyrus K. Remington giving the battery's history.

Edison-Westinghouse Case Postponed. PITTSBURGH, May 21.—Owing to the non-arrival of Justice Bradley, of the United States Supreme Court, the hearing of argument in the case of the Consolidated Electric Light Company vs. the Edison-Westinghouse case has been postponed until to-day.

They Will Arbitrate. ALBANY, N. Y., May 21.—Rathbone, Sard & Co. have agreed to submit the difficulty existing between them and their molders to a committee of arbitration to be selected by the mayor of the city. Pending the action of the arbitrators the company agreed to resume operations to-day in shops 4 and 5 and in the others as soon as they can be made ready. By the opening of these shops about 400 men will be set to work at once.

Shot Himself in the Head. NEW YORK, May 21.—John Carr, aged twenty, employed as a night watchman and assistant engineer in a laundry at No. 9 Clinton Place, committed suicide early yesterday morning by shooting himself in the head. He was a nephew of ex-Secretary of State General Joseph B. Carr.

Washington Letter.

The Post-office Department has held up a lot of star route mail contracts in different sections of the country and it is thought they will be declared void and new bids advertised for. The following are the contractors interested: W H Smith, C W Underwood and J W Pigg, of Missouri, and S S Chappell, of New York. The trouble arose from the fact that the names of the contractors, the sureties and the witnesses were all signed in one hand writing. An investigation soon proved that all the names were signed by one of the witnesses, a woman, who claimed she had authority from the parties to sign for them. It is held by the Department to be irregular and illegal, if not fraudulent.

HE IDENTIFIED HIMSELF. How Senator Cullom Worked His Way Into a Convention Hall.

Senator Cullom met a newspaper man here to-day, writes a Washington correspondent, who recalled to his mind a curious incident of the National convention of 1880, in which both took part. Cullom was then Governor of Illinois, and the newspaper man was a keeper of one of the inner doors at the convention. When they met the newspaper man remarked: "Senator, you may not remember it, but you owe me a debt."
