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FROM WASHINGTON.

There is no news from below. All telegraphic communication south of Lebanon Junction is stopped.

The 4th Ohio arrived here this morning. On passing the headquarters of Gen. Anderson at the Lewisville Hotel, they were addressed by the General.

An intelligent passenger from Hillsboro to-day reports that fifteen hundred of Buckner's forces, mostly from Harding county, Kentucky, are eight miles south of the place, and that the bulk of his force is still at Bowling Green.

The Bulletin correspondent says the Lebanon train yesterday brought in Matt. Jewett, General Fisher Ewing, William Smith and William Taylor, prisoners who had escaped from the Confederates.

Great enthusiasm is manifested by the Southern army in Federal troops from the North destined to form a portion of our aid force.

The steamer Saxonia was intercepted this morning with three days' later news. The policy of sending reinforcements to Canada is questioned.

It is expected that the combined Anglo-French military and naval expedition against Mexico will be organized to obtain relief for injured British and French interests.
