OLDEN CAPITAL IS PRACTICALLY ISOLATED FROM ALL OF WORLD

Red Division Almost Annihilated Before Reaching City

Pskov Is Under Bombardment By The Estonian Troops

[By Associated Press to The Banner] LONDON, Oct. 20—The war office today states that the troops of General Denikin have driven the Bolsheviki from Kiev, which they temporarily occupied last week.

[By Associated Press to The Banner] LONDON, Oct. 20—Petrograd is virtually isolated, the war office announced today, anti-Bolshevik cavalry having cut the railroads leading from Petrograd to Moscow, Volozda and Vitebsk.

A Bolshevik division which was being rushed to Petrograd from the interior to defend the city against the threatening advance of General Yudenitch was virtually wiped out at Kraanoe Selo when General Yudenitch took that outpost to Petrograd, according to war office advices.

The white flag was hoisted over Kronstadt Friday, the war office announced today.

The war office further announces that Pskov, the important railway town south of Petrograd, is under bombardment by the Estonian troops. Petrograd is reported to be preparing for a siege. Machine guns are posted to command the principal streets and supplies of food are being brought into the city.

GARY AGAIN REFUSES TO REcede FROM HIS STAND FOR OPEN SHOP

Refuses To Negotiate With Employees Other Than His Own

IS SAID TO FEAR ANY FURTHER RECOGNITION

Capital Group of Labor Conference In Session All Forenoon

[By Associated Press to The Banner] WASHINGTON, Oct. 20—Reaffirming his refusal to negotiate with representatives of labor unions not employed in the plants of the United States Steel Corporation, Judge Gary, chairman of the corporation's board of directors, informed Chairman Lane of the national industrial conference and Secretary Morrison of the American Federation of Labor, today, that he would not recede from his stand for the open shop.

Judge Gary was understood to have expressed fear of the consequences of further recognition of labor unions. The effect of his announcement on the industrial conference remains to be developed. The capital group remained in session all forenoon, forcing a postponement of the conference meeting until 2:30 p. m.

BAKER REFUSES THE REQUEST OF HYLAN TO POSTPONE ACTION

Maintenance of Army Transport Service Necessary, He Replies

[By Associated Press to The Banner] WASHINGTON, Oct. 20—Secretary Baker today refused the request of Mayor Hylan of New York to postpone the use of troops at New York until further efforts could be made to settle the unauthorized strike of longshoremen there. Mr. Baker said maintenance of army transport service out of New York was a part of the war operations of the government and that he intended to continue the operation of the ships. He added that he was willing, however, to co-operate with the authorities in any possible way "to bring about an adjustment of the strike."

FEDERAL TRADE BODY CONTAINS FORCE HOSTILE TO U. S. IDEAS

Many Investigators Of Meat Packers Anarchists, He Avers

Declares Man In Charge A Notorious Exponent of Socialism

[By Associated Press to The Banner] WASHINGTON, Oct. 20—Sensational charges that Socialists, Reds and other radicals are entrenched in the governmental departments and particularly that the investigating forces of the federal trade commission contained men hostile to the government and American institutions were made in the senate today by Senator Watson, Republican, of Indiana, who introduced a resolution for an investigation by the interstate commerce commission.

Disclaiming any defense of the great meat packers, Senator Watson declared that the open records of some of the commission's employees and that investigation showed them to be respectively outspoken anarchists, participants in Red propaganda, Germans, admirers of Lenin and Trotsky and avowed exponents of soviet government.

Of Stuart Chase, who had general charge of the investigation of the meat-packing industry, Senator Watson charged that besides being a well-known exponent of socialistic doctrines, he was president and organizer of the Fabian club of Chicago, a society founded "for the express purpose of furthering the doctrines of socialism."

Grouped about him at federal trade commission headquarters were Victor Berger and many other extreme Socialists. His office became the rendezvous of men devoted to the destruction of property, to the overthrow of government and consummation of the ideals of socialism.

On Chase's specific instructions, Senator Watson charged, the commission's accountants inflated the showing of profits of the packing companies. Chase, he said, wrote a magazine article assailing the United States government for not recognizing the Russian Reds.

RIGHT TO SEIZE FOOD SUSTAINED

Supreme Court Refuses To Review Appeals In Ohio Case

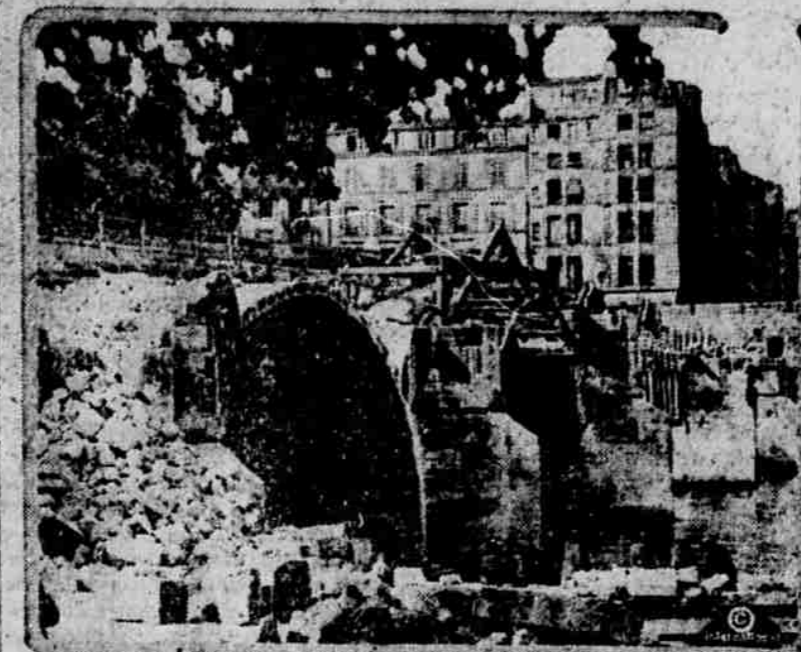
LONGSHOREMEN TO REMAIN ON STRIKE 'TIL DEMANDS MET

TEN CENTS, THE SUGAR PRICE TO WHOLESALERS

Steps Taken To Prevent Abnormal Increase In Price

[By Associated Press to The Banner] WASHINGTON, Oct. 20—Steps to prevent an abnormal increase in the price of sugar because of the existing shortage were taken today by the department of justice.

Attorney General Palmer notified beet sugar refiners who have been withholding their products from the market until the price situation became more stabilized, that the United States sugar equalization board had determined that ten cents was a fair price to be charged the wholesalers and that any charge in excess of that amount would be regarded in violation of the food control act.

The price to the wholesalers heretofore has been nine cents, so that the new price means an increase of one cent a pound.

HAMILTON MAN Maltreated By Six Masked Men

CLAIM HE CIRCULATED SEDITIOUS PAMPHLETS

Kidnapped, Administered Drug, Stripped Naked and Tared

[By Associated Press to The Banner] HAMILTON, Ohio, Oct. 20—Following his experience of being chloroformed, taken to a woods north of here and treated to a coat of tar and feathers, John E. Steiger, local Socialist leader, today received a letter advising him to leave the city in ten days on pain of being more severely treated. Steiger did not indicate whether or not he would comply. He was suffering today from severe nervous shock.

According to the story told by Steiger, he was returning from work when he was seized by six masked men who jumped from an automobile. He was taken to the woods in the machine, chloroformed, and when he awoke he was naked with the tar and feathers streaming from him. He found his clothes near by and put them on over the tar and walked home as best he could.

Incidents that led to the attack were that circulars attacking the government were distributed in the city last week which were signed by Steiger and another Socialist.

UNDER ORDERS TO USE FORCE IF NECESSARY, SAYS GENERAL

Five Hundred Soldiers Given Task Of Ending The Congestion

Troops Will Aid In Moving Transports Or Any Other Work

NEW YORK, Oct. 20—Five hundred soldiers of the regular army were landed here today from the transport George Washington to attempt to end the congestion at the army piers in Brooklyn, caused by the longshoremen's strike. The men are under orders "to shoot if necessary," according to a statement made by Brigadier General Davison, chief of troop movements at the port of embarkation. "The troops will act in moving transports or whatever else is necessary," said General Davison.

U. S. STEEL CO. IS OPPOSED TO A SETTLEMENT

Gary Declares Arbitration Demand Should Be Ignored

[By Associated Press to The Banner] WASHINGTON, Oct. 20—Arbitration of the steel strike demanded by the labor group should not be considered by the national industrial conference, Judge Gary, chairman of the board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation and a member of the public group, told the conference today.

The corporation will not agree to any arbitration and stands firmly on its previously announced policy as regards the question, Gary said. It was his first pronouncement to the conference.

SINN FEIN MEETINGS WILL BE SUPPRESSED

[By Associated Press to The Banner] DUBLIN, Oct. 20—The general effect of the government proclamations suppressing the Sinn Fein parliament and Sinn Fein organizations throughout Ireland is to make these organizations illegal. It will be an offense to hold a meeting of these bodies in the proclaimed areas or to publish reports of any such meetings. As these organizations declare their purpose to be the overthrow of British rule in Ireland and the establishment of an independent Irish Republic, and as that purpose has long been illegal under the ordinary law, the proclamation merely provides a speedier means for the trial of offenders and a greater probability of their conviction. They can now be tried by two resident magistrates instead of by the usual petty sessions bench and there is in every case an appeal from the decision of the county court judge.
