HOG CHOLERA FEARED IN KNOX COUNTY

Expert Sent Here To Investigate Cases Said To Exist In Harrison Township

Fearing a hog cholera epidemic in Harrison township, the officials late Thursday afternoon appealed to the state agricultural department and Earl Maxwell of the state department was sent here to investigate.

As none of the hogs was dead, the expert was unable to ascertain whether they were suffering from cholera.

However, the owner of the hogs, William Hancock, was directed to remove the animals to his farm in Morgan township and keep them penned up pending further developments.

Hancock bought the hogs at a sale, it is claimed, and took the animals to his farm in Harrison township.

SUPERVISORS OF COMING ELECTIONS ARE ANNOUNCED

Judges And Clerks Are Named By The Election Board EQUAL SPLIT, NUMBER OF PRESIDING JUDGES

Twenty Of These Are Democrats And Twenty Are Republicans

Judges and clerks for the various voting precincts in Knox county, to serve during the oncoming election, were announced Tuesday afternoon by the Knox county board of elections.

It is rather a remarkable coincidence that there are an equal number of presiding judges—20 Democrats and 20 Republicans. A voting precinct's judge is determined, politically, by the vote cast at the last preceding election. Thus, if the precinct goes Democratic, its next presiding judge will be a Democrat, and vice versa.

COURT NEWS

In the case of Rowland D. Kulb vs. Norman Beeman, an answer was filed in the court of common pleas Saturday morning.

The defendant states that the plaintiff did not begin the action to recover real estate for more than 21 years after the death of Sarah Ann Culp.

Plaintiff brought suit in common pleas to quiet title. He alleged in his petition that certain real estate was left to the defendant, Norman Beeman, by the terms of the will of Sarah Ann Culp, and the plaintiff is now claiming an interest in the property.

The defendant in his answer claims that the plaintiff has allowed 21 years to "pass peacefully away" before bringing any action in the court.

Ewalt & Blair are the attorneys for the plaintiff.
