

BRYAN SPEAKS HERE NOV. 1



Noted Commoner To Give Dry Speech At 2:30 P. M. At Vine Street Church of Christ.

William Jennings Bryan is making five speeches daily for the Ohio dries. He is making the trip by auto and is accompanied by Dr. H. H. Russell, Westerville, founder of the Anti-Saloon League, and Rev. W. E. Fitch, Columbus, who speak briefly.

Mr. Bryan will be in Mt. Vernon Saturday afternoon, November 1, at 2:30, in the Church of Christ, East Vine street, according to P. S. Kelsner, county "dry" manager. Other addresses for that day will be made at Delaware, Cardington, Urbana and Bellefontaine.

It is announced that all the meetings are free and that women as well as men are invited. Rev. J. A. Long, pastor of the church, is assisting in arrangements.

With scores of other issues pressing for settlement, Mr. Bryan is silent, on this tour, on everything except prohibition. He will explain the troublesome Ohio ballots and tell how to mark them to vote dry.

Mr. Bryan will urge that all the wet proposals be defeated and that the dry ones be approved, not only for the sake of Ohio, but also for the sake of national prohibition. It is admitted by the "drys" that the Ohio election is of national importance. Mr. Bryan also will declare for rigid enforcement of all local, state and national dry laws, and election of of-

ficials entirely committed to enforcement.

World-wide drouth as the next thing to be accomplished will furnish part of Mr. Bryan's address. He will tell of a campaign already entered into by the World League Against Alcoholism, of which the Anti-Saloon League is a constituent, to make the civilized nations dry.

First of all, however, the Bryan itinerary is for the purpose of keeping what the dries have gained in Ohio. He will urge that whatever be the fate of court decisions, the people will settle the question of 2.75 beer at the polls.

Mr. Bryan sums up the marking of ballots by advising his hearers to put the longer word (Yes) on the longer ballot, and the shorter word (No) on the shorter ballot—thus voting dry all around.

By those who have heard him recently, the Nebraskan is said to be speaking with as much force and eloquence as in the days when he was a presidential candidate.

He is telling the people that there is no partisanship in the wet and dry issue, and that prohibition has been brought about and will be kept by people of all parties and all denominations.

However, for the moment when he does mention parties, he says that "Democrats can do nothing else than vote dry and Republicans must follow suit or lose out."

All Mt. Vernon clergymen have been asked to co-operate in arranging for the meeting and making it a success.

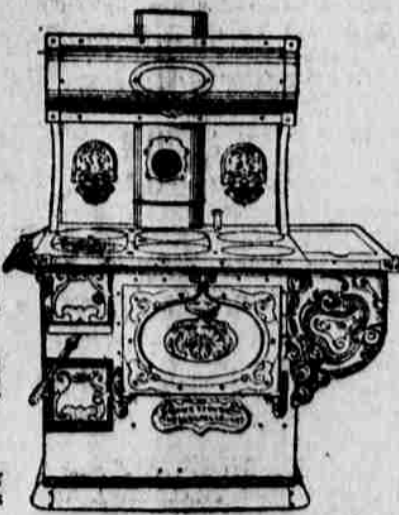
