

OHIO BEING WATCHED BY FIFTEEN STATES DECLARES MR. HANLY

An Ex-Governor of Indiana Speaks For The Drys In Mt. Vernon Last Evening

Pointing out the vital position occupied by Ohio in the forthcoming elections, as regards the "dry" cause, former Governor Frank Hanly of Indiana addressed a large meeting Wednesday evening at the Presbyterian church.

This was the third speech delivered by the ex-governor during the day. He spoke at Danville at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and at Fredericktown at 6:15.

According to Mr. Hanly, Ohio is being carefully watched by 15 states which have the initiative and referendum. What is done in this state in November will prove a deciding factor in steps that may be taken in these 15 states on the "dry" question.

According to Mr. Hanly, these 15 states may go "wet," although they have ratified the national prohibition amendment. This is in case the supreme court of the United States holds that states possessing the initiative and referendum may vote on the question again.

As 36 states are needed to ratify the national amendment and as 45 have already done so, it is plain, according to Mr. Hanly, that 15 states, in reversing their attitude, would throw the whole question open once more and there would not be a dry United States.

1,500 KNIGHTS IN MANSFIELD PARADE

A banquet for all visiting knights was followed by an entertainment at the Opera House. A military ball concluded the day's program.
