DEDICATED.

The New School House is
Completed

And Has Been Dedicated to the
Glorious Work

Of Educating the Rising Generation—The
Future Men and Women.

The sun shone brightly and all nature
smiled on the occasion of the dedica-
tion of Perrysburg's new school build-
ing.

A programme had been arranged
which included music and several
addresses, prominent among which was
the address of O. T. Corson, State
Commissioner of Schools and the ad-
dress of Mayor Hollenbeck.

The exercises were opened with
prayer by Rev. G. A. Adams, followed
with a vocal solo by Mr. Wedertz ac-
companied by Mrs. Brandhuber.

Prof. Corson was then introduced
and gave his audience a plain, practical
and sensible speech. One that could
be understood by all and which con-
tained practical truths, and coming
from one who has made a success of
school teaching, made it all the more
forceful. He had made a close inspec-
tion of the building and was highly
pleased with its every feature, and in
his address, he complimented the
Board of Education on the work they
had accomplished, and urged the peo-
ple to give their hearty support to the
schools and teachers, and while he be-
lieved the people had the right to criti-
cise the public schools, he said that
criticism should be just, fair and manly,
and not of the fault finding, "back
biting" sort, often indulged in by
parents who could not control their
children at home, but expected the
teacher to do what they, themselves,
had failed to accomplish. He also re-
ferred to the building as being an ex-
cellent business investment, as it shows
to the country that the town is keeping
abreast of the times and is offering to
citizens one of the greatest inducements
to become residents of the town—an ex-
cellent and modern school.

His address was excellent in every
particular and was highly appreciated.

A quartette by Mrs. Williams, Mrs.
Eberly, Mr. Maddy and Dr. W. H.
Reinfrank, accompanied by Miss
Bertha Cranker was the next very ex-
cellent vocal number, after which
Architect Bacon and Contractor
Kerresh each made brief remarks.

Mayor Hollenbeck was then intro-
duced and delivered an address con-
taining reminiscences of old school
days which called to mind the names of
many pupils and teachers of the days of
long ago, and related several interest-
ing incidents connected with early
school days. He referred in a very
feeling manner to many of his old
school mates and friends who were
associated with him in early life, nearly
all of whom had passed to the great
beyond.

He spoke of the dedicatory exercises
of the old school building, which took
place on the evening of January 1, 1849,
and was referred to in the Toledo Blade
of January 4, 1849, as follows:

"In the evening a very large audience
composed of citizens of the towns of
Perryburg, Maumee and Toledo,
assembled at the spacious and elegant
new Union School house just completed
by the citizens of Perryburg, for the
purpose of witnessing the ceremonies of
dedication. A juvenile choir welcomed
the audience by an appropriate ode, etc.
The exercises were interesting and in-
structive, and the new school at Perry-
burg promises to exert all influences in
the valley. The school house is one of
the finest in the west and is to be in-
definitely supplied with necessary ap-
paratus, books, etc. for instruction in
all branches of English education. We
wish our neighbors success in their en-
terprise. They deserve it for their
liberality, and for the example they
have furnished to other towns in the
valley."

Also the Fort Meigs Review, a paper
then published in our village, in re-
ferring to the exercises on that
occasion, said: "The dedication of the
new school house was novel, but highly
interesting. The exercises consisted of
an introductory prayer by the Rev.
H. C. Skinner, addresses by the Rev.
Anson Smyth, of Toledo, our fellow
citizen, Mr. F. Hollenbeck, Mr. Kapp,
of New York and Mr. Wright, princi-
pal of the school, interspersed by sing-
ing under the direction of Mr. Daniel
Witcomb, by a juvenile choir instructed
by him expressly for that occasion.
Their performance was highly creditable
to teacher and pupils."

The building then dedicated was de-
scribed as being a "spacious brick edifice,
two stories high, 60x90 feet, and
containing four large rooms, etc."

The school prospered until 1868,
when it was remodeled and enlarged
and continued in use until the fire on
the morning of May 23, 1894, destroyed
it.

His address was highly pleasing to
his audience, and was well received.
The quartette again favored the
audience, after which E. L. Blue of
Perryburg JOURNAL made a few re-
marks.

Clerk James Hayes read the report
of the funds in the Treasury and after
a vocal selection by Mr. Wedertz the
exercises closed with the benediction
by Rev. D. H. Bailey.

The audience then made an inspec-
tion of the building and all seemed
pleased with the edifice.
Dr. Bowers acted as chairman of the
meeting in the absence of President
J. H. Thornton, and very ably per-
formed that service.

A description of the building has
been given heretofore.

NO CHANGE MADE.

Perryburg Township Voting Pre-
cincts Remain the Same.

Lime City Will Get a Voting Precinct in
the Spring.

On Saturday last the County Board
of Supervisors of Elections held a regu-
lar meeting at Bowling Green and
listened to arguments for and against
dividing Perryburg township in such
manner as to give Lime City a voting
precinct.

The proposition was first made to
divide in such manner as to give one
precinct at Perryburg and one at
Lime City, but this was opposed and
the proposition to divide the township
into four precincts was made, and upon
this question the Board became weary
and decided to postpone further consid-
eration of the matter until a later
meeting.

The proposition is to give Perryburg
School district No. 1, one pre-
cinct, also locate one at the Five
Points; one at Lime City and one some-
where in the northern part of the
township between Perryburg and
Lime City.

The change, if made, will not affect
the election this fall.
