Some men wait for favorable circumstances, but George Peabody made circumstances favorable. He was a saver and had invested his money wisely, so in the panic days of 1837, when the business of the country was prostrated, and its credit at a low ebb, he was able to come to the rescue and abate the crisis by buying American bonds freely. His similar deeds of philanthropy and patriotism at home and in England enlarged with the growth of his fortune. He gave over a million dollars to the Peabody Institute at Baltimore, and erected an Industrial Home for the London poor costing two and a half millions.
