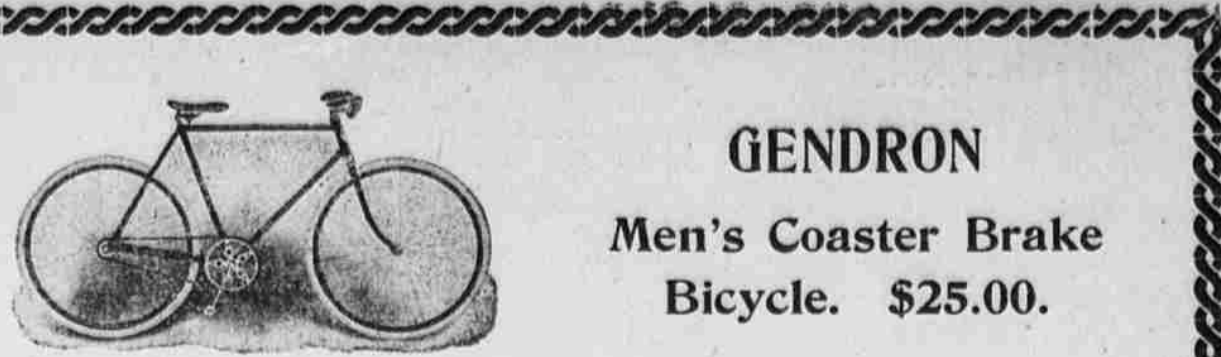

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Council Rooms, Feb. 24, 1914. Council met in adjourned session. Present, Clerk and Councilmen Braun, Leydorf, Muir, Neiderhouse, and Witzler. Absent, Mayor and Councilman Meeker.

President, Mr. Leydorf introduced a resolution authorizing the purchase of 500 feet of Red Cross Fire hose at 90c per foot. Whereupon said resolution was fully read. Moved by Mr. Leydorf, seconded by Mr. Muir that said Resolution be adopted as read and a contract entered into. The motion carried unanimously.

Council met in regular session Feb. 25. Present, Clerk and Councilmen Braun, Leydorf, Muir, Neiderhouse and Witzler. Absent, Mayor and councilman Meeker. Pres. protm Braun Presided.

Engineer Champe being present reported the progress made in regard to the disposal of sewage in the Maumee River.

Mr. Witzler introduced a resolution authorizing Mr. Geo. Champe and Atty. Chapman to represent the village at the meeting of the State Board of Health to be held in March. Stating to said Board that the Village would be willing to provide a way for the disposal of its sewage after the city of Toledo had taken care of its own and also asking said State Board for a modification of the conditions under which the Elm St. relief sewer may be constructed.

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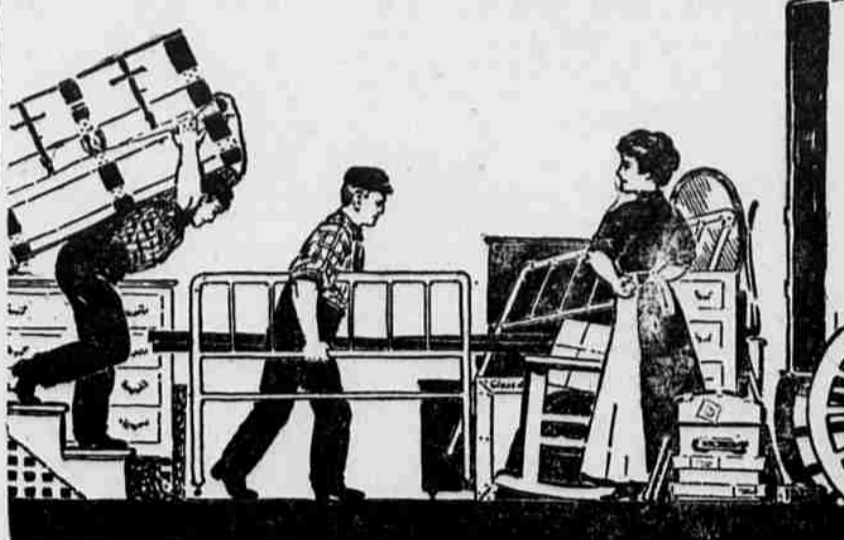
