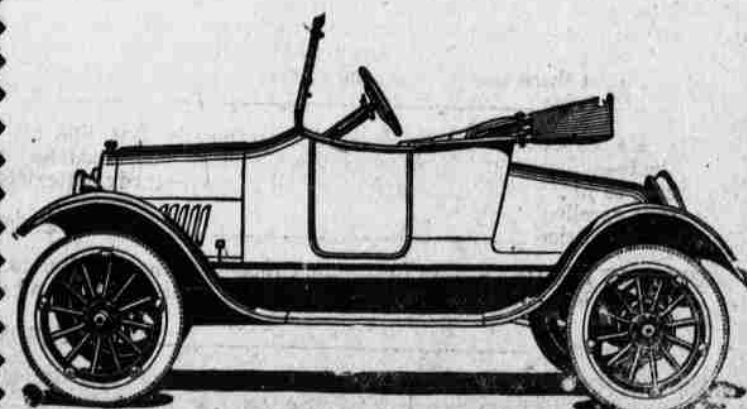

NOTICE OF ELECTION.
The qualified electors of the Incorporated Village of Medina, Ohio, will take notice that there will be submitted to said electors at the Primary election to be held and held in said Village on the 27th day of April, A. D. 1920, at the usual voting place or places in said Village, the proposition of exempting from the limitations of Sections 5649-2, 5649-3a and 5649-5b of the General Code of Ohio, all subsequent levies for interest and sinking fund purposes on account of the bonded indebtedness of said Village, to-wit, on account of the bonds of said Village issued and sold prior to January 20th, 1920, and thereafter, and sinking fund purposes on the funds of said Village derived from the collection of taxes levied or to be hereafter levied and collected.
The exemption of said tax limitation to extend to and be in force and effect for a period of ten years, beginning with the year A. D. 1920, and the rate of taxes that will be required for said interest and sinking fund purposes in the next succeeding year on the basis of the present duplicate will be two and one-half mills.
The electors at such election desiring to vote in favor of said proposition shall place a cross mark on the ballot, in black lead pencil, to the left of the words "For exempting interest and sinking fund levies on account of outstanding bonds from all tax limitations, "Yes."

A RESOLUTION.
A RESOLUTION providing that there be submitted to the electors of the Incorporated Village of Medina, Ohio, at the Primary election to be had and held in said Village on the 27th day of April, A. D. 1920, the proposition of exempting from the limitations of Sections 5649-2, 5649-3a and 5649-5b of the General Code of Ohio, all subsequent levies for interest and sinking fund purposes on account of the bonded indebtedness of said Village, to-wit, on account of the bonds of said Village issued and sold prior to January 20th, 1920, and coming due and payable thereafter and which are payable out of the funds of said Village derived from the proceeds of taxes levied or to be hereafter levied and collected for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon.
Section 1. That the Council of the Incorporated Village of Medina, Ohio, (two thirds of the members thereof being present and concurring therein).
Section 2. That whereas the said Incorporated Village of Medina, Ohio, having a bonded indebtedness on January 20th, A. D. 1920, amounting in the aggregate to \$1,978.00, and hereafter becoming due and payable out of the funds of said Village derived and to be derived and hereafter coming into the Village Treasury from the proceeds of taxes levied or to be levied for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same shall become due and payable; that the amount of taxes that may be raised by the levy of taxes within said taxing district at the maximum rate authorized by Sections 5649-2, 5649-3a and 5649-5b of the General Code of Ohio, are insufficient and that it is expedient to levy taxes at a rate in excess of the said maximum rate authorized by said Sections.
Section 3. That the said Village be submitted to the electors of the said incorporated Village of Medina, Ohio, at the Primary election to be had and held therein on the 27th day of April, A. D. 1920, the proposition of exempting from the limitations of Sections 5649-2, 5649-3a and 5649-5b of the General Code of Ohio, all subsequent levies for interest and sinking fund purposes on account of the aforesaid bonded indebtedness of the said Village of Medina, Ohio.
Section 4. That the rate of taxes that will be required for interest and sinking fund purposes in the next succeeding year on the basis of the duplicate for the year A. D. 1920, will be two and one half mills, and that the exemption of said limitations of said tax levies in said taxing district shall extend to and be in force and effect for a period of ten years, commencing with the year A. D. 1920.
Section 5. That the electors of the said incorporated Village of Medina, Ohio, voting at said election, on the proposition aforesaid, shall have printed on their ballots for the aforesaid purpose, the following, viz:
"For exempting interest and sinking fund levies on account of outstanding bonds from all tax limitations, "Yes."
"For exempting interest and sinking fund levies on account of outstanding bonds from all tax limitations, "No."
Section 6. That the Clerk be and hereby is authorized and directed to cause a certified copy of this Resolution to be duly certified to the Board of Deputy State Supervisors of Elections in and for Medina county, Ohio, and that said certified copy of said election to be published once a week for four consecutive weeks prior to said election in the Medina Gazette and Medina Sentinel, two newspapers of opposite politics published and of general circulation in said taxing district.
Section 7. That this Resolution be and hereby is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, peace and safety of said Village and the inhabitants thereof, and shall go into immediate effect, and for the reason that said Village has not now sufficient funds or income from taxes that may be levied and assessed wherewith to pay its indebtedness and make numerous necessary improvements necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health and safety of said Village and the inhabitants thereof.
Section 8. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and approval by the Council of the Village of Medina, Ohio, on the 24th day of March, A. D. 1920.
