**COMMISSIONERS BOOST NORTH COURT PAVING**  
 \$200 from the dog fund was ordered transferred to Medina Co. Humane Society.  
 Commissioners agree to pay 50 per cent of the cost of constructing an 18-foot concrete pavement on Bank st., Lodi, from the west corporation line to the W. & L. E. Ry. tracks; also on Medina street from present brick paving to corporation line.  
 Commissioners authorized the building of a culvert on Brunswick center road one and half miles from village.  
 Agreement made to pay half of cost of constructing 18-foot 8 inch deep concrete pavement on N. Court street, from end of brick paving to city limits this in lieu of \$6000 formerly appropriated for this work.  
 Commissioners agreed with York tp. trustees to repair road from corporation line of Medina to B. & O. Ry. crossing in York tp., county to pay 50 per cent of cost; not to exceed \$3000 for present year.

**WILL GIVE DANCES TO RAISE MONEY FOR SIRENE**

The Medina Fire Department held its regular meeting Friday night with a good attendance. The proposition of buying a siren announcer was discussed and as council has no money to pay for this improvement, the boys decided to raise the funds and buy one themselves.  
 A series of dances will be held to raise the money — \$475 is necessary. The first dance will be held in Odd Fellows Hall on Wednesday evening, April 7. Other date will be announced later.  
 The question of buying rubber coats for the firemen was discussed. Council has told the firemen that it has no possible funds, and as the boys must have the coats, it was finally decided that instead of paying the firemen for their work at fires outside the city limits, the money thus received from pleased contributors will be put into a fund and the coats paid for out of this fund.
