A RESOLUTION
A RESOLUTION declaring it necessary to construct a sanitary sewer in Jefferson Street from East North Street south a distance of Three Hundred and Seventy (370) feet to a point near the south line of Lot No. One Hundred and Eighteen (118) in Sewer District No. One.

WHEREAS the owners of a majority of the front footages of lands bounding and abutting upon both sides of Jefferson Street from East Street south a distance of 370 feet to a point near the south line of Lot No. 118, in Sewer District No. One, have petitioned in writing for a construction of a sanitary sewer along said street between the points above named.

AND WHEREAS the Board of Education of the Village of Medina, Ohio, (three-fourths of all members elected or appointed thereto concurring.)

SEC. I.—That it is by the Council deemed necessary to construct a sanitary sewer in Jefferson Street from East Street south a distance of 370 feet to a point near the south line of Lot No. 118 in Sewer District No. One.

SEC. II.—That said sanitary sewer shall be constructed in accordance with the general sewerage plan of said village as heretofore adopted and now on file in the office of the Village Clerk, and that the estimate of the cost and expense therefor as prepared by F. C. Randall, Engineer, and now on file in the office of the Village Clerk be and the same is hereby approved and adopted.

SEC. III.—That the cost and expense of the construction of said sanitary sewer, except the one-fifth part thereof, which shall be assessed against and paid by the Village of Medina, shall be assessed by the front lot owners abutting upon both sides of said street from East Street south a distance of 370 feet to a point near the south line of Lot No. 118 in Sewer District No. One, and said lots and lands are hereby found and determined to be specially benefited by reason of said improvement; that the cost and expense of said improvement shall include the expense of printing, publishing and serving all notices, resolutions and ordinances required, and the cost and expense of the construction of said sanitary sewer, together with interest in anticipation of the collection of deferred assessments and all other expenditures made necessary by reason of said improvement.

SEC. IV.—That the special assessment so to be levied and assessed against the lots and lands bounding and abutting upon both sides of said street between the points above named, shall be paid in ten annual installments, with interest at six per cent. per annum, payable annually, provided however that the owner of any property so assessed may at his or her option pay such assessments in cash within 20 days from and after the passage of the assessing ordinance, in which case said cash assessment shall not include any item of interest on the collection of such deferred assessments.

SEC. V.—That the bonds of the Village of Medina shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of all such assessments that are not paid in cash and in an amount equal thereto and shall be sold in manner and form as provided by law.

SEC. VI.—That the remainder of the entire cost and expense of said improvement, not so specially assessed and including the cost of intersections, together with the cost of any real estate or interest therein, purchased or appropriated and the cost and expense of any appropriation proceedings therefor, and all damages awarded therein, shall be paid out of the general sewer fund of the Village of Medina or by the issuance of bonds in manner and form as provided by law.

SEC. VII.—That the Village Clerk be and hereby is authorized and directed to cause a notice of the passage of this resolution to be served upon each owner of the lots and lands bounding and abutting upon both sides of said improvement.

SEC. VIII.—That this resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest date allowed by law. Passed Aug. 30, 1921.

NOTICE OF SALE OF SCHOOL BONDS
Sealed proposals will be received at the Town Hall of Montville Township Medina County, Ohio, until 12:00 Noon on Saturday the 17th day of September A. D. 1921 for the purchase of bonds of The Montville Township Rural School District, Medina County, Ohio in the aggregate sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00), dated October 1, 1921 in the denomination of one Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) each, and shall be numbered consecutively from One (1) to Twenty (20) inclusive and shall be due and payable as follows: Bond No. 1 shall be due and payable on the 1st day of May A. D. 1927 and

one bond shall be due and payable on the first day of November and May of each year thereafter up to and including November 1st 1946.

Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of May and November of each year until fully paid, except that the first payment of interest shall be made on the first day of November 1922, both principal and interest being payable at the depository of the Board of Education of the Montville Township Rural School District, Medina County, Ohio. Delivery of said bonds will be made at said depository as soon after the sale thereof as the same are prepared. Said bonds are issued by virtue of Sections 7625 to 7628 inclusive of the General Code of Ohio and under and in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Education of the Montville Township Rural School District, Medina County, Ohio adopted on the 22nd day of August A. D. 1921 and for the purpose of acquiring land, erecting, equipping and furnishing a school building thereon for the more proper accommodation of the schools of said district.

Said bonds will be sold to the highest bidder for not less than par plus the accrued interest. All bids must state the gross amount of bid and accrued interest to date of delivery. All bids must be accompanied by a certified check in an amount equal to two (2) per cent. of the amount of the bid payable to the Treasurer of said Board of Education on condition that if the bid is accepted, the bidder will receive and pay for the bonds awarded him upon delivery thereof.

Said check to be retained by and become the property of the Board of Education, if said condition is not fulfilled, otherwise to be returned to the bidder. Bidders will be required to satisfy themselves as to the legality of the issue of the said bonds, but full transcript will be provided the successful bidder as required by law. The Board of Education reserves the right to reject any or all bids. Bids must be sealed and endorsed "Bid for School Bonds, Montville Township Rural School District, Medina County, Ohio."
