

HOME DEPARTMENT.

Our three months' volunteers arrived at Camp Chase on Wednesday last week. About thirty from Holmes and Perry Counties, mostly from the former, being assigned to their company, (Co. H., 88th Reg.) it numbers ninety-three men, over six of whom are from this County. On the day after their arrival in camp, they elected their commissioned officers, who are: Capt. B. B. Woodbury, of Georgia; 1st Lieut. John S. Orr, of Morrow; 2d Lieut. Martin H. Hamblin, of Georgia. The non-commissioned officers are not yet elected. The 88th is one of the Regiments which are to remain in the State, for guard duty.

Hon. Warren Chase will lecture on the state of the country, at the Disciple Church in this village, on Thursday evening next.

Capt. Geo. L. Wood has returned to Warren. He received a severe flesh wound at the Battle of Fort Republic, from a musket ball, which passed through the thigh. He is unable to walk or sit up, but we are glad to learn that the wound is not considered dangerous.

We are requested to state that, as peace has not been declared, there is work to be done by our Aid Society. It continues to meet regularly every Wednesday afternoon, at Odd Fellows' Hall, which is opened for the purpose, free of charge. We are informed by ladies present at the last meeting, that the Hall was not crowded, and that a larger turnout at future meetings is highly desirable. Needles, thread and intellectual refreshments provided for all who may attend.

Messrs. Eilman and Parnell, of the 7th Regiment Band, have arrived at home. It is understood that all the Band are soon to be discharged.

From the 6th Ohio Cavalry.

The following extract from a letter of Mr. Chas. Shuteck, of this place, to his mother, will be of interest to all of our readers who have friends in the 6th Cavalry. The letter is dated Mount Jackson, June 6th:

We had a fight with Jackson's army the other day, and have driven him about 40 miles. We drove him from Strasburg to the Shenandoah River, where he burned the bridge. We were in sight of him when the bridge was on fire. Our cavalry was in the advance, and when we came up to the bridge, they fired upon us, and killed one man. The day before, we killed about fifty or sixty for them. Our company was brought up to support the artillery. We had some killed and wounded. John Granger and I were riding together. He had his horse shot from under him, and I had a canister shot go through my hat. It made a hole as big as my fist. It was a close call for me. The shells were bursting all around, but we stood it well. I was rather frightened, but no more than the rest. We took one battery and about 800 prisoners.

The Rebels have made a stand about five miles from here, across the river, and just as soon as the river falls, so that we can ford it, we shall be at them again. We calculate to take this whole array. We are having some pretty hard times—some good; we take anything we want.

Those who do not know that our townsmen, Mr. A. Bail, cultivates strawberries of the very largest and most delicious varieties, are hereby assured of the fact. We have reason to know, Mr. B. having generously presented us with a goodly supply.
