Washington, April 1.—Is the House to-day Mr. Ward, of New York, from the Committee on Commerce reported a joint resolution setting forth among other things in the preamble on the 11th of September, 1864, for the purpose of extending reciprocal trade between the British North American Colonies and the United States, that nearly all the articles which Canada has to sell are admitted into the United States free of duty, while heavy duties are now imposed upon many of their articles, which people of the United States have to sell with the intention of excluding them from the Canadian markets and that the President, during the XXXVth Congress, caused to be submitted to the House an official report setting forth the inequality and injustice existing in our present intercourse with Canada, subversive of the true intent of the treaty, owing to the subsequent legislation of Canada; but it being decided that friendly relations should continue between the United States and the British North American Provinces, and that commercial intercourse should be hereafter carried on between them upon the principles of Reciprocity, beneficial and satisfactory to both parties, therefore Resolved, That the President be authorized and requested to give notice to the British Government that it is the wish and intention of the Government of the United States to terminate it at the end of twelve months from the expiration of ten years from the time the treaty went into operation; such notice to be given at the expiration of the said term of ten years to the end that the treaty may be abrogated unless a new Convention shall be concluded by that time, be concluded between the governments, by which the provisions shall be abrogated, or so modified as to be mutually satisfactory to both governments; and that the President be authorized to appoint three commissioners, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, for the revision of the said treaty, and to confer with other commissioners, duly authorized therefor, whenever it shall appear to be the wish of the Government of Great Britain to negotiate a new treaty between the two governments, and the protocol of both governments based upon the true principles of the reciprocity, and for the removal of the existing difficulties.
