TELEGRAPHIC SUMMARY.

A commissary warehouse belonging to the Government has been destroyed by fire near Salt Lake City. Loss over \$1,000,000.

The post-office building in Davenport, Iowa, has been destroyed by fire. Loss \$4,000 or \$5,000.

The citizens of Ohio now in Washington have held a meeting. Chief Justice Chase in the chair, and taken appropriate action with reference to the death of Governor Corwin.

Captain Semmes, late of the Alabama, is reported to have been arrested in Mobile and taken to Washington. He was an officer under General Johnston at the time of his surrender, and was included in the capitulation.

The General Assembly of Kentucky has adjourned to the 10th prox.

Congress has compromised on the 5th prox., as the day on which they will meet again.

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 20.—Look out for a big river. It has been snowing most all day, and it is now raining. There is now twelve feet and rising fast.

A dispatch from Brownsville says there is twenty feet with four inches snow on the ground.

This rise will enable a large amount of coal to depart for the lower markets. There is great activity among tow-boatsmen preparing.

A pair of floating boats broke loose above the dam, and were dashed to pieces about seven o'clock. No lives were lost.

The House of Reformation at Manchester, (N. Y.) was destroyed by fire yesterday morning, loss, \$40,000. The 120 inmates were all saved.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., December 20.—The Wakened Mills, in South Kingstown, Rhode Island, were burned this morning. Loss \$75,000. Insurance light. The mills were owned by Gideon Reynolds, who manufactured cotton jeans.

HAYTI.—MONSIEUR TAUBER.—There was great excitement at Port-au-Prince. Reinforcements were being sent forward to Cape Haytien, where an attack from Salnavas was expected.

The Post's Washington special says Senator Sprague has started a movement in the Senate looking to an increase of tariff on all goods that can be manufactured in this country.

New York, December 20.—The Commercial's Washington dispatch says the President's action in restoring to the Southern States, which have adopted the constitutional amendment, the enjoyment of all their constitutional privileges except representation in Congress, paralyzes the action of the radical Republicans.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., December 20.—Hon. Samuel Ames, for ten years Chief-justice of the Rhode Island Supreme Court, died suddenly this afternoon, of apoplexy.

A letter from Millidgeville, Georgia, says nothing of importance was transacted by the Legislature during the first week of its session.

Several important bills have been introduced and read the first and second times in both Houses, but none of them were passed.

Opinion prevails that no legislation would be valid while the General Assembly is deprived of the co-operation of the Constitutional Executive, whose official approval is indispensable to the legality of its acts.

Many measures for the government and protection of freedmen have been introduced.

A Tallahassee letter says the crops of Florida have been injured from want of care during their growth, though not ruined.
