STILL CRITICAL

IS THE CONDITION OF GENERAL PHIL SHERIDAN.

His Narrow Escape from Death by suffocation when seized with the Cough, His Heart Still Troubling Him, The Benefit Derived from the Oxygen Treatment, and No Decided Change Yesterday.



WASHINGTON, June 1.—General Sheridan's condition yesterday remained unchanged. He is critically ill. There has been more or less of a recurrence of the heart trouble, but the exact degree and the extent of it can not be learned at this hour.

At 10 o'clock this morning the patient was seized with a severe and dangerous affection of the lungs and the greatest alarm prevailed among General Sheridan's physicians.

The sick man slept most of the day, and though he grew no weaker, his condition was such that he could not get up, before he was attacked with the cough. Late in the afternoon he had another severe attack. He recovered very imperfectly and at 10 p. m. when his condition caused the greatest apprehension.

Dr. Lincoln was sent for at 11 p. m. to assist the four physicians already in attendance. At that hour members of the press were denied admittance to the house. A policeman was on duty to return and would permit no one to pass.

The fact that Dr. N. S. Lincoln was called in, started the report that dissatisfaction existed with the treatment. The attending physicians. This was in no sense the case. It was simply done with the desire to leave nothing undone which by any possibility could be done to improve his chances.

No change was made in the treatment. This has all along been said, been excellent, and had it not been for the constant presence of physicians, he would have died before now during some of his sudden weak spells.

General Sheridan inherited rapid phlegm from his mother. She was also subject to heart trouble and has lived to a ripe old age after passing through several severe spells similar to this. This lends some slight hope in the present desperate condition of General Sheridan. Dr. Lincoln said that the case was not entirely without hope.

A Farmer's Crime. HOLDREGE, Neb., June 1.—A. J. Winquest, a farmer, went into a saloon last evening in an intoxicated condition, and on being refused liquor drew a revolver. Will Kurdes, the bartender, undertook to take the weapon from him, when Winquest fired, the ball striking Kurdes above the left eye, killing him. Winquest then shot himself twice in the head, inflicting fatal injuries.
