ROSETTA ARMSTRONG FREE. Our readers will remember that soon after Rosetta was restored to her guardian, Yan Slyke, she was rearrested by Robinson, the U. S. Marshal, and, as he refused to give up the girl, another writ of habeas corpus was issued by Judge Parker, and the hearing upon it was had on Monday last week.

On Tuesday morning, the 3rd inst., at 10 o'clock, Commissioner Pendry delivered his opinion in the case of the Reverend Mr. Denison, and his claim of Rosetta as a fugitive slave.

LIBEL SUIT.—The libel suit between Gill of the Patriot, and Hartshorn of the Buckeye, in which Gill was prosecutor, was tried by the Probate Court of Columbus county last week, and was disposed of at the close of the county. This contest was of a personal character, between these two gentlemen, for certain libelous articles, as charged by Plaintiff, written and published in the Buckeye State, during the campaign of last fall, which arraigned the character of Mr. Gill, who in vindication thereof brought suit against the defendant and Mr. C. Wilson.

We learn from the Patriot that the case will have another hearing at the May term of that Court. We are sorry to see such things exist between our brethren of the press.

NEW BOUNTY LAND BILL. We publish below the instructions of the commissioners of Pensions giving full information as to the facts which must be established in order to obtain warrants. We published the law itself a few weeks since, and as there are many in our county embraced in the act we deem it proper to give the following a place in our columns.

CIRCUAR FROM THE COMMISSIONER OF PENSIONS. Pension Office, March 5, 1855. The act entitled "An act in addition to certain acts granting bounty land to certain officers and soldiers who have been engaged in the military service of the United States," approved March 3, 1855, entitles each of the surviving persons of the following classes to a certificate or warrant for such quantity of land as shall make, in the whole, what they may have heretofore received, one hundred and sixty acres, provided he shall have served a period not less than fourteen days, and shall establish said service by record evidence, to wit:

1. Commissioned and non-commissioned officers, musicians and privates, whether of the regulars, volunteers, rangers or militia, who were regularly mustered into the service of the United States, in any of the wars in which this country has been engaged since 1793.

2. Commissioned and non-commissioned officers, seamen, ordinary seamen, marines, clerks and landsmen in the navy in any of said wars.

3. Militia, volunteers and state troops of any state or territory called into military service, and regularly mustered therein, and whose services have been paid by the United States.

4. Wagonmasters and teamsters who have been employed, under the direction of competent authority, in time of war, in the transportation of military stores and supplies.

5. Officers and soldiers of the revolutionary war.

6. Chaplains who served with the army in the several wars of this country.

7. Militiamen who served in the war of 1812. Each of the surviving persons in the following classes are entitled to a like certificate for a like quantity of land, without regard to the length of service, provided he was regularly mustered into service, and shall establish the same by record evidence, to wit:

1. Officers and soldiers who have been actually engaged in any battle in any of the wars in which this country has been engaged.

2. Those volunteers who served at the invasion of Plattsburg, in September, 1814.

3. The volunteers who served at the battle of King's Mountain in the revolutionary war.

THE BALIC ARRIVED AT NEW YORK ON THE 6TH, and brought European dates to the 24th of March.

The first of the four points of the guarantee, placing the Danubian Provinces under the protection of the four Powers, was unanimously agreed to.

The new steamer City of Baltimore, in the Liverpool and Philadelphia trade, has been taken up by the French Government for six months. She left Liverpool for Marseilles, having in tow the American ship Ticonderoga, which was also engaged by the French Government.

The Casar had made several speeches, mild to the diplomatic body, and strong to the army. On the whole his language is interpreted in a pacific sense.

The Paris correspondent of the London Times telegraphs, under date of Friday evening, that the news from Vienna appears favorable to peace; and the people are disposed to believe that the Conference will be attended with happy results.

Official reports of the storming of the Malakoff redoubt, on the night of the 23d of February, by the French, as published, exhibit one of the most gallant achievements of the campaign.

Nicholas' death was announced at Sevastopol on the 6th of March. Letters state that Russian preparations indicate the evacuation of Bessarabia without contest.

On the night of the 13th, the ice was breaking up generally in the Baltic. The flying British squadron and the first instalment of the Baltic fleet, sailed from Spithhead for Kiel on the 20th of March.

The House of Lords, Lyndhurst and Clarendon had spoken severely against the vacillating conduct of the Prussians. The proceedings of Roebuck's committee were drawing to a close.

The Legislative Assembly of Denmark unanimously voted the impeachment of the tax ministers.

The French attempt to storm Shanghai proved a failure. Nothing of importance from Canton.

The Baltic brought 59 passengers, including Bishop Timon. A French squadron of 25 steamers on the way to Genoa had embarked with Sardinian troops for the Crimea.

Odessa advised the 14th, that Prince Menshikoff died in February, at Simpheropol. Doughtful. The Russians had sunk three or four ships of war at Sevastopol. The French hospital at Constantinople had been burnt to the ground; 86 persons perished.

The palace of Beglerbeg has been repaired and put in order for Louis Napoleon.

THE STATE PENITENTIARY AT NASHVILLE (Tenn.) is in ruins. The fire broke out at 3 o'clock in the morning, in the cabinet depot of the Penitentiary. The fire spread with great rapidity; in a short time the portion of the buildings set aside for the different branches of trades became a burning mass. The east wing of the building then caught fire, and in so much damaged as to render it useless. The walls were thrown open, and the prisoners conveyed to an enclosure inside the walls. One convict named Quiner, was smothered to death. Not a single prisoner escaped. All the tools in the different shops were destroyed, as well as all the work being manufactured. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.

FROM EUROPE. ARRIVAL OF THE BALIC. The Baltic arrived at New York on the 6th, and brought European dates to the 24th of March.

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Fifty men left Boston for Halifax on the 28th ult., evidently for the purpose of enlisting in the regiment for the Crimea. The agent said they were Railroad laborers.
