Only the immediate families were present.

Congressman Charles J. Thompson, of Denance, ran 3,261 votes ahead of his ticket in the election two years ago, notwithstanding the fact that the hardest fight was waged against him ever made before. He received 40,384 votes in the district; Senator Willis received 40,000, while Governor Davis received 37,123 votes in the district. Thompson received 3,261 more votes than Davis, and 216 less than Willis, in the District, although Thompson ran ahead of Willis 207 votes and ahead of Davis 1002 votes in Delia's county.

Thompson's official majority was 14,989; Willis' official majority 15,043; Davis' official majority 15,942. Thompson put up a gallant fight against great odds and won easily. Had he been on the National ticket, with President Harding, of course, he would have run stronger, but in Ohio Senators and Congressmen are re-elected to run on the State ticket. President Harding, head of the National ticket, received 42,037 votes in the district; 1,653 more than Thompson received; 1,437 more than Senator Willis received, and 4,914, more than Governor Davis.

No Republican Congressman in the history of the district had been able to carry the same in a Presidential year. This shows clearly the strength of Congressman Thompson with the people of his district. His popularity is due to the fact that he has been a real Congressman, and has served all the people, Republicans and Democrats alike, faithfully, honestly and efficiently. Another element of his strength is his loyalty to the poor people of the district, or those known as the common people.
