VOICE ALONE NEVER BROUGHT SUCCESS

Beauty and Gracious Stage Presence Also Are Necessary.

INGRAM QUALITIES

Prima Donna Who Is to Appear Here Possesses Them All.

There probably never was a woman who became famous as a singer for her voice alone. She had to be of prepossessing appearance and have an excellent stage presence. Miss Ingram, the noted general opera singer, who is to be heard here the night of Thursday, February 17, in connection with the first grand concert of the Apollo club, possesses practically all the qualities necessary to make her what she is—one of the foremost prima donnas in the American concert stage today.

Miss Ingram is young and beautiful and her stage presence is gracious to an extreme. Then, too, she is possessed of a voice which has startled her admirers, most members of which were connoisseurs of the art of voice culture, and the critics always have spoken glowingly of her.

It is with no little satisfaction, therefore, that members of the Apollo club were so fortunate as to be informed that their efforts to secure Miss Ingram for this concert were successful and every one of them now is waiting with little anxiety for the concert date.

Her Famous Songs.

Many of the songs which have contributed to Miss Ingram's success are included in the Tulsa program. Although the first part consists chiefly of compositions of foreign musicians, the second and third parts are made up chiefly of English masterpieces of the composer, art which are designed to please the most skeptical of audiences.

"The Serenade" is perhaps the first number of the second part in which Miss Ingram will be heard, while "The Transient" by Dix also is of the second part. "Cry of Rachel," one of the songs which probably have contributed more to the prima donna's success, is of the third part, however, and with it are such masterpieces as "Angels in the Home," "New's the Time to Love," "Dawn in the Desert" and others.

The program of the club was arranged with no little precision on the part of the director, Professor Robert Bruce Stewart. There will be 22 voices with accompaniment, by Miss Marion Duval and Miss Margaret Ringgold, who will use two Steinway grand pianos.

The three hundred associate members of the Apollo club will be entitled to four seats for this and the second concert for a consideration of \$2.50, or about 87 1/2 cents per seat. The prices of admission for the general house-paying public will range from \$1.50 to \$5.00. It is the intention now that the grand opera house, where the grand concert will be held, will be filled to its utmost capacity.
