School Lands Went High. OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Nov. 1.—The school land sales force which has been holding the sale of lands in the Ninth sales district, including lands in Cimarron and Texas counties, completed the work Wednesday and returned home today. The total sales will aggregate approximately \$2,000,000 which is nearly double the appraised value of the lands and a greater gain than has ever been made on school land. The lands in Cimarron county brought \$1,650,000. Here the greatest quantity and the best land was sold. The sale began on September 22. The land sold in Texas county will bring the aggregate up to nearly \$2,000,000 to be realized from the lands in both counties.

Fain Gets Office Soon. LAWTON, Okla., Nov. 1.—Returning home from Washington today, John Fain, former county attorney, and who has been mentioned as the successor of Homer N. Boardman, United States attorney for the western Oklahoma District, said that it would be only a short time until he would be appointed and confirmed for the place. The appointment of Fain is credited to United States Senator Gore. If Gore succeeds in landing Fain he will have accomplished considerable in the patronage line, as it is generally understood that it was through his influence that Dr. J. O. Newell of Jennings was made United States marshal for the Western Oklahoma District.

FIRE AT CARTER, OKLA. DOES HEAVY DAMAGE

C. C. HAMMONDS, STATE FIRE MARSHAL TO INVESTIGATE CAUSE.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Nov. 1.—C. C. Hammonds, state fire marshal today received word of the burning at Carter, Beckham county, of the store belonging to J. D. Clay, who conducts a general merchandise business there. The building belonged to J. R. Estess. Both building and goods were a total loss, that of the building \$2,000 and the stock of goods at \$10,000. There was \$1,000 insurance on the building and \$2,500 on the stock of goods. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is claimed the store had been robbed before the fire was started, as the back door was open. Fire Marshal Hammonds will probably make an investigation.

NORTHERN PACIFIC WILL REMAIN OVER

ONE OF HANDSOMEST EXHIBITS AT EXPOSITION CAN BE VIEWED TODAY.

START TO GIVE LECTURES

Traveling Immigration Agent for Road Will Hold Meetings in This Vicinity Shortly.

A considerable disappointment was felt by the officials of the International Dry-Farming congress when O. J. Stark, traveling immigration agent of the Northern Pacific railroad, announced that owing to a future itinerary, which must be met, it would be necessary to dismantle the road's beautiful exhibit at the exposition grounds Saturday night, owing to shipping arrangements. This would have caused the Montana exhibit to dismantle at the same time, and in this way rob the exposition of two of its most attractive features. Owing to a liberal use of the wires, however, and a readjustment of plans at a considerable expense, L. J. Bricker, general immigration agent of the Northern Pacific railway, advised Mr. Stark that an extension of twenty-four hours could be arranged, thereby enabling these exhibits to remain intact until Sunday evening, this will enable the thousands of people of Oklahoma who have as yet been unable to see this remarkable exhibit a chance to view the products grown along the line of this enterprising railway of the northwest. This exhibit has been the chief drawing card for the crowds seeking the artistic displays of the wonderful development of the Lake Park country of Minnesota, the wonderful wheat lands of North Dakota, the famous Yellowstone valley and tributary valleys of Southern Montana, and the exceptionally high-grade fruit, grain and forage districts of southwestern Montana, Northern Idaho, Washington and Oregon.
