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AUBURN WON GAME FROM VANDERBILT

SCORED A VICTORY OVER McGINN'S MEN, FIRST TIME IN 20 YEARS

BATTERED DOWN THE LINE

Auburn Playing Fearfully Scored the Winning Touchdown Just Before End of the Game

RICKWOOD FIELD, BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 15.—For the first time in 20 years Auburn today matched a victory from Vanderbilt University, defeating the McGinn machine, 14 to 6.

Battering and plugging, the Auburn back field battered the Vanderbilt line permanently. As a result, gaps were torn in the defense, but most of the ground gaining resulted from broken field dashes behind and almost impenetrable interference.

Auburn was the first to cross the goal line. Playing carefully but stoutly, the ball had advanced between the two goals for the greater part of the first quarter, neither team obtaining any marked advantage.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—The Dartmouth football team, although regarded by many as the best eleven in the east, was easily beaten this afternoon by the Carlele Indians, 35 to 10. All Carlele points were made on straight football. Dartmouth scored on a goal from the field and a forward pass that was caught and carried over the goal line.

The game was played on the Polo grounds and 15,000 persons saw the contest. Dartmouth played the open game that had been expected of her, but the Indians depended on battering their way through the field without being the ball.
