GOVERNOR SPEAKS WORD OF ENCOURAGEMENT TO YOUTH OF THE STATE

'TULSA PLAN' AT EDMOND

Relay Race Marked Opening of "Community Work" By Y. M. C. A. at State Normal, Tulsa.

A message to the boys of Oklahoma was read by Governor Lee Cruise last Saturday, when he started three youths on the first lap of a relay race from Oklahoma City to Edmond. The runners carried a message from the governor to the mayor of Edmond.

The race was staged under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. and was commemorative of the opening of Y. M. C. A. community work in Edmond. State Secretary Fred Garrison introduced the race.

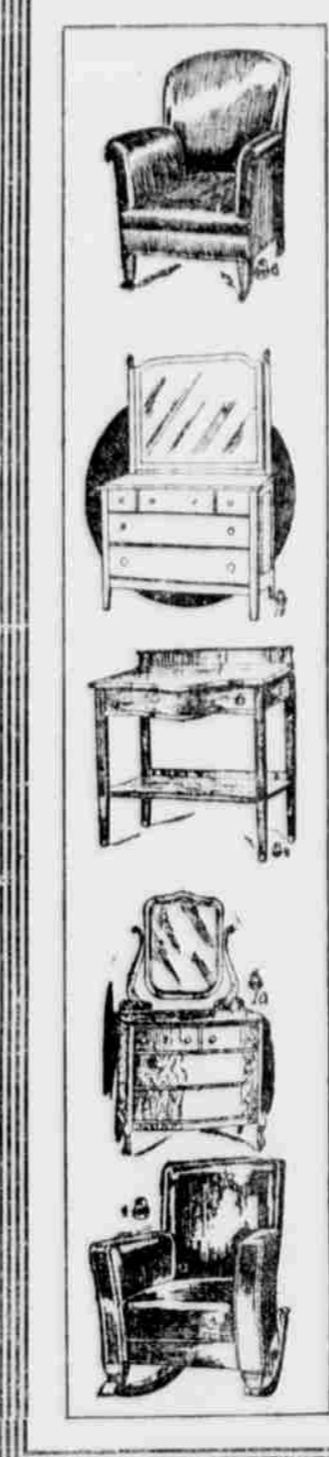
It is interesting to note that the plan of Y. M. C. A. work to be followed in Edmond has been patterned after the "community type of boys work" originated in Tulsa by local Y. M. C. A. Secretary C. K. Burchner. This same plan has attracted nationwide attention and the "Tulsa Plan," as it is generally known, is now being adopted in all parts of the United States and Canada.

Governor Cruise's timely and meaningful message follows:

State of Oklahoma, Lee Cruise, Governor, October 4, 1913. To the Boys of Oklahoma: I send greetings to the boys of Oklahoma. This is an era of progressive development. Each generation guided by the experiences of the past generation, should improve social conditions, and there should be a constant approach toward idealism in human and governmental life. That this may be true of the future, the boys of today should fit themselves for useful, intelligent and honorable citizenship. Oklahoma has provided abundant means for the intellectual development of her boys, and that boy is wisest and most fortunate who to the fullest degree takes advantage of the opportunities afforded him. Intellectual development, however, is not sufficient. To attain full growth as a desirable citizen, moral development is just as essential. If Oklahoma boys of today who will compass our citizenship of the future are to show a substantial improvement over the present, let them embrace to the fullest extent the opportunities for physical, spiritual and intellectual development that lie within the reach of each of them; standing at all times for purity and truth, and avoiding those habits that tend to mar them physically, spiritually and intellectually.

That your future years may be filled with usefulness and your regrets may be few, I admonish you to devote to careful preparation the time allotted by nature to boyhood. Be not too anxious to throw off the mantle of the boy and assume the habiliments of the man, remembering that the days of youth when past will

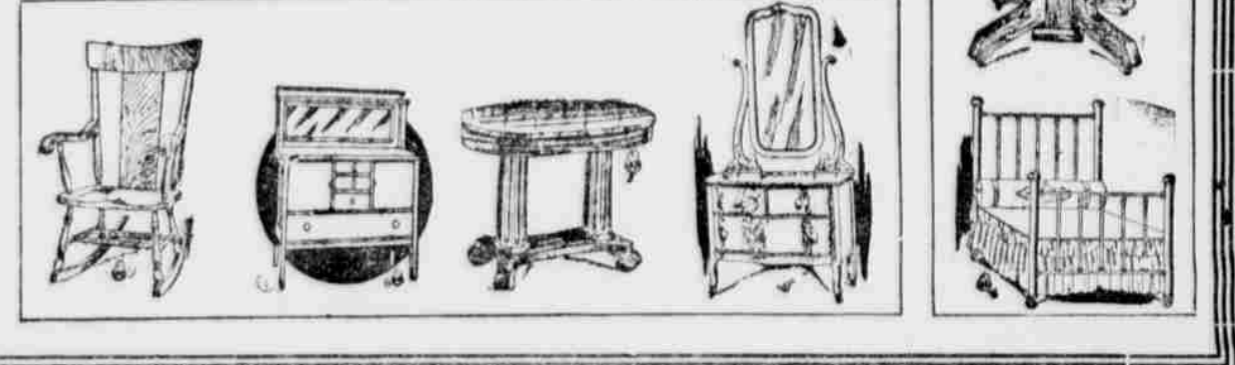

Celebration of the Famous Snake Dance Is in Reality an Old Indian Prayer for Rain

Shungavi, the well known Hopi Indian and Chautauqua lecturer, furnished the writer some years ago, a very vivid word picture of the snake dance which is still practiced among his people in the southwest. The origin of this weird and uncanny ceremonial is shrouded in the mysticism of the dim past. Today its celebration is in reality a prayer for rain, and the belief in its efficacy is proverbial. Three different snakes are used, the rattlesnake, the bull and the whip snakes. The last two are not venomous. Early are the participants lacerated by the rattlers, this no doubt, the careful handling of them and to the "holding" of them from the time of capture to that of the dance. The ceremony is divided into several complicated secret rites being the gathering of the snakes from far and near, the making of a sand altar, the washing and cleansing of the snakes, the wild and awful snake drama and lastly the races which are held on the morning of the public dance of the female clan of the tribe. It appears that two clans—the snake and the Antelope—participate in the opening service. The Antelopes are first to appear clad in the paraphernalia of their clan, fully painted and march to the ceremonial grounds. They march four times around, stamping on a board placed in the east for the purpose, in purification to all that the demand for rain is to be made. After this they form along the south side and sound the rattles when the Snake performers appear and face the Antelopes. The formal dance opens and interludes in volume as the time progresses. When the performers begin leaping, the snake dancers form in groups of three and begin leaping and hopping until they reach a hut at the east side where are concealed the snakes and the snake passers—persons chosen for that duty. As each performer kneels a snake is passed to him and he cramps it in his mouth and rising begins the circling of the ground, each in turn receives his snake, and must enfold the ground four times. When the circling has been completed the performer drops his snake and the snake passers pick them up and return them to the hut.
