LET HER FRIENDS BEAT HER

Constitutional Charges Made; Couple Re- fused License in Tulsa; Married in Claremore.

Last Thursday a wealthy Indian, who was refused a marriage license in Tulsa last August, and later married in Claremore, was yesterday sued by his wife, a 14-year-old girl, for divorce and alimony.

The suit was filed in the superior court by Mrs. Katie Gilstrap in the name of Elizabeth Hogue, a 13-year-old girl, a minor. The petition alleges that Gilstrap treated his wife with extreme cruelty that cost them their marriage. Gilstrap and his friends would hold drunken orgies at their home that during this time Gilstrap often beat and abused his wife, that on the last occasion he knocked her down and when she got up, one of his companions hit her and was not rebuked by her husband.

Gilstrap, who is a ward of the county court, tried to secure a marriage license here last August, but Judge Conn Linn refused him a license on the ground that he was an "immorality" and therefore could not marry. Not to be deterred, however, Gilstrap and his girl bride went to Claremore, where they secured a license and were wed.

MEETING OF NIGHT SCHOOL STUDENTS

ANYONE WHO INTENDS TAKING ADVANTAGE OF NEW SCHOOL SHOULD ATTEND.

CLASSES WILL BE FORMED HERE FOR FARM CONGRESS

Superintendent Oberholzer Will Address Students Tonight at High School Building.

Tonight in the assembly room of the Central high school a meeting of all persons in the city who wish to attend night school will be held. The meeting is called for 7:30 and Superintendent of City Schools E. H. Oberholzer requests that all who can find it possible attend tonight's meeting as classes will be organized. It is expected that at least fifty will attend the meeting and enroll in the night school. C. E. Blocker, secretary of the Y. M. C. A., states that he has found no messengers in Tulsa who say they will attend the school and it is expected that many others who have not yet been reached will report at the high school tonight. Superintendent Oberholzer announces that no tuition will be charged unless it is required by law. However, if tuition is charged it will apply only to persons 21 years old or over. When the night school is formally opened it will be the first time in the history of Tulsa that such a school has been held.

OKMULGEE WANTS NEW TRAIN TO THIS CITY

TOWNS BETWEEN HERE AND THERE DESIRE SERVICE TO FARM CONGRESS.

From communications received within the last few days from people residing between Okmulgee and Tulsa on the Frisco railroad it is apparent that the railroad has overlooked the making of adequate train schedules between these points during the International Dry-Farming congress. The communications state that the only train from Okmulgee leaves there at 11:33 o'clock in the morning and leaves Tulsa on the return trip at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. This makes it impossible for people in the vicinity of Okmulgee to visit the congress and return home the same day, the schedule allowing but two hours' stay in the city. The Frisco railroad has been asleep to the interest of its own welfare in this connection and the people of many towns are indignant at this attitude. The towns most affected by this inconvenient schedule are Okmulgee, Hamilton, Beige, Brown, Switch, Mounds and Kiefer. The Frisco should arrange immediately for a train leaving Okmulgee at 7 or 8 o'clock in the morning and returning from Tulsa at an hour later than the present schedule. Late trains are employed in some farms, and these have the most valuable heating power. U. S. INFANTRY IS ENCAMPED IN CITY

COMPANY OF SOLDIERS FROM FT. LOGAN IL. ROOT OF AR. KANSAS ARRIVED.

CLASSES WILL BE FORMED HERE FOR FARM CONGRESS

Artillery Band from Fort Sill Will Arrive First of Next Week—To Hold Manoeuvres.

Martial law reigns on the exposition grounds of the International Dry-Farming congress, at least the Infantry from Fort Logan, Ill. Root of Arkansas, are encamped on the grounds and hold rifles over the little city of army tents. The soldier boys arrived yesterday afternoon at 8 o'clock, with full equipment and field rations. They arrived over the Midland Valley at 1:30 o'clock and were met by Secretary John T. Burns of the farm congress and a delegation of business men. The men were immediately taken to the exposition grounds, located on their site and they then returned to the Midland Valley where they secured their baggage and moved to the grounds. The company consists of 62 men and two officers. The officers are First Lieut. Wilson and Second Lieut. Carr. The troops came here in two special cars and carried a baggage car filled with tents and equipment. By noon last night the camp was completely installed and the American flag floats over the village. The equipment consists of ten sleeping tents, two mess tents and a headquarters tent. The soldiers are located at the south end of the race track between the street car gate and the convention hall building. The Fifth Regiment Artillery band from Fort Sill, Okla., will arrive here the first of next week and will be located before the congress and exposition opens. Robert A. OLD FOOTBALL LIKE A PARLOR PASTIME

NEW GAME MUCH MORE DANGEROUS THAN OLD SAWS AUTHORITY.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—The weekly list of football injuries is appalling as compared with records of "casualties" in contact of ten years ago, according to an authority on the problem, game writing today in the Chicago Daily News. Despite the new rules many of which were designed to eliminate injuries and lessen chance of injury, the "new" games make the "old" look like a parlor pastime, he says. The critic does not blame the present code or method of play for all injuries but says the changes have in part defeated their very purpose because they are responsible for the loss of the skill with which old time players avoided injury. He cites the instance of one half-back of Chicago, player working only 142 yards who went through four seasons under the old rules, carrying his full team and yet asked for "time out" only once. Several years later a successor to this player, weighing more himself but opposing weight of his weight than the "old timers," was taken out in his first college game suffering more bruises than the first named got in his whole career.
