Lorenzo D. Curtis was tried before Judge Gates last Friday on a charge of adultery, found guilty and sent over the road in default of \$1500 bail.

At all these places they represented themselves as man and wife and were thought to be such. A drummer who had known Curtis at Cisco saw him here and on a subsequent visit to Cisco dropped a few remarks that put the wife on the track.
