SUICIDE.

Mrs. HATTIE BAILEY HANGS HERSELF THIS MORNING.

Mrs. Hattie Bailey, wife of O. S. Bailey, committed suicide this morning about 9 o'clock by hanging herself.

The reporter was on the scene in a little while and learned from Mr. Bailey the following particulars. Family trouble was the cause leading to the tragedy. It appears that this was her fifth effort at taking her life within the past few months. Mr. Bailey said this morning before day, Mrs. Bailey asked him to go to a drug store and get her some medicine which he did. On his return he heard a noise as if something falling heavily on the floor. He rushed into the room and found his wife had fallen from a box on which she was standing while fastening the strips of cloth torn from a sheet and twisted into a cord, to the staple in the ceiling.

She was choking but by quick action the cord was removed and her attempt thwarted for the time being. She soon rallied and expressed herself as being sorry for her action and said she would give up the idea of self destruction. Mr. Bailey was requested to go out and get her a cup of coffee. He did so and it was while he was away on this errand that her work was completed. Mr. Bailey says he was not absent exceeding twenty minutes. The body was swinging from the ceiling suspended by the same strips of sheeting with which she made the first attempt. Mr. Bailey cut her down at once but life was extinct. The neighbors were informed of what had happened and quite a crowd of curious spectators were soon on the scene.

The trouble in the family dates

back to last May and was brought about by charges of infidelity on the part of the wife towards the husband. On yesterday they had agreed to a separation and she was to have left this morning for Denison. Her things had been packed and carried to the depot but owing to the inclemency of the weather she decided not to go until this afternoon.

From a colored woman, who lives near it was learned that the woman was very unhappy and that she told her that she would rather die than go away.

Mr. Bailey is deeply affected but he does not feel that any blame can be attached to him. When the reporter reached the house, the marks of the cord were plainly visible around her neck. Death came from strangulation.

The remains will be buried tomorrow.

While the woman may have been wayward and brought on her own unhappiness, yet who can refuse to throw the mantle of charity over her past and have a sympathetic feeling for her sad ending.

Later.—Since the above was put in type it has been learned that the body is being embalmed and will be held subject to instructions from her parents in Missouri. Telegrams have been sent and a reply is hourly expected.
