### CHEROKEE PAYMENT BEGINS NEXT WEEK

Attorney W. W. Hastings An-  
nounces Itinerary of Dis-  
bursing Agent

Special to Daily Leader.  
 Tahlequah, Okla., Jan. 5.—Attor-  
 ney W. W. Hastings announces that  
 fractional land payment to the Cher-  
 okees will begin being paid out next  
 month. This announcement is as fol-  
 lows: "The payment of small amounts  
 of money to the allottees of the Cher-  
 okee nation to equalize the allot-  
 ment of the lands will begin at Tah-  
 lequah, January 10. Mr. Wise, the  
 disbursing agent, will be there one  
 week and from there he will go to  
 Stilwell and remain perhaps a week,  
 and will come to Tahlequah not later  
 than January 24. This is not the em-  
 igrant payment, but the small  
 amount due allottees for the allot-  
 ment of their lands. Each allottee  
 is entitled to twice the amount of  
 land he is deficient in money. For  
 instance, suppose there is one day  
 allottee \$5.00 in land, he will get  
 twice that amount of money or  
 \$11.20. Only those allottees who have  
 less than \$50 coming to them will be  
 paid. No new born children will be  
 paid anything until the suit is set-  
 tled that is pending in the supreme  
 court. When an Indian comes to get  
 this money, if a legal guardian has  
 been appointed for a minor child he  
 must bring his letters of guardianship  
 with him to be copied by the  
 disbursing agent. In the event no  
 guardian has been appointed, the  
 money will be paid to the parents or  
 natural guardian. There will be in  
 round number \$175,000 disbursed to  
 35,000 allottees, not including new  
 born children nor allottees to whom  
 there is more than \$50 coming, nor  
 to an allottee who has an allotment  
 contest over land pending and un-  
 settled."

 carried away four small pigs from

 their flight southward to the Wichita  
 mountains they simply slipped to  
 take in fuel for the remainder of the  
 journey.
