PRESIDENT NAMES EXEMPTION RULES

Affidavits Must Accompany All Claims of Being Immune From Military Service.

SELECTION PLAN UNKNOWN

Lottery System Indicated by Instructions to Give Each Man Serial Number.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Preparation for mobilization of the first contingent of 625,000 troops of the new national army advanced another step today when President Wilson promulgated regulations governing exemptions from military service.

Local and appeal exemption boards already have been appointed and the names of other dependents when the men under training for duty in France.

Selection Plans Still Guarded.

In the order in which they must come there are three steps in organization of the national army prescribed by congress: registration, selection and exemption. The first has been carried thru and approximately ten million men, 21 to 31 years old, have been registered. The regulations issued today cover exemption, but information concerning selection is still lacking and officials are guarding closely the method on which it is to be applied. Exemption boards will be organized when the selection machinery is finished the names of the men whose fitness and desirability for army service the boards are to judge. The war department is progressing with the difficult task of finding officers for the force. Part of these will come from the 16 officers' training camps. The first ten thousand of the forty thousand men at the camps will be selected for commissions in the first increment of the new army. That is less than half the number of officers necessary.

Lists to Be Published.

Upon organizing, the local boards will take over from the registration boards all registration cards which they will number and issue. Then after having been advised of the method by which the quota to be drawn from its territory (minus credits for enlistments in the national guard or in regular army) each board will prepare a list of names designated for service in the order of their liability, post the list, give it to the press and within three days send to each designated person. As the men so notified appear the boards first will make a physical examination and then pass upon special regulations to be provided, bearing in mind that all persons accepted by them will be examined by army surgeons. If the physical examination is passed successfully then comes the question of exemption.

Who Are Exempt.

Persons who must be exempted or discharged are those who are included officers of the United States, of the states, territories and the district of Columbia; ministers of religion, students of divinity, persons in the military or naval service of the United States, subjects of Germany, all other aliens who have not taken out first papers, county or municipal officers, customhouse clerks; workmen in federal armories, arsenals and navy yards, persons in the federal service designated by the president for exemption, pilots, merchant marine and those with a status with respect to dependents which renders their exclusion desirable (a married man with dependent wife or child, son of a dependent widow, son of dependent, aged or infirm parents or other dependents or orphan child under 16 years of age); those found morally deficient and any member of any well recognized religious sect existing May 18, 1917, whose creed forbids participation in war and whose religious convictions accord with the creed.

Affidavits Necessary.

Claims for exemption because of dependents may be made by the man himself, his wife or other dependents or by a third party who has personally investigated the case. A claim made by the husband must be accompanied by supporting affidavits signed by the wife and by those with a family residing in the same territory. A claim by the wife or a third party must be accompanied by two supporting affidavits signed by heads of families. Similar rules govern claims on the grounds of military service. District boards must decide appeal cases within five days after the closing of proofs and their decisions are final. If the ruling of a local board is affirmed the person in question stands finally accepted for military service. Certificates of exemption will not necessarily be permanent. They may be revoked with changing conditions or may be granted only for prescribed periods.

WAR EXPENSE NEXT YEAR FOR U. S. TO BE \$2,326,000,000

WASHINGTON, July 2.—A final draft of the war tax bill, reduced from \$1,800,000,000 to \$1,670,000,000 and carrying no provision for additional bonds, was completed tonight by the senate finance committee and will be reported to the senate tomorrow.

Next year's war expenses are placed in new estimates submitted today by the treasury department at \$2,326,000,000, but Secretary McAdoo advised the senate finance committee that additional bonds were not necessary at this time.

LICENSE SLEUTH ON THE JOB NOW

Thousand Tulsa Automobile Owners Must Pay Up or Stand Fine.

UNCE SAM LOANS JOHN BULL \$25,000,000 MORE

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Twenty-five million dollars was placed to the credit of Great Britain today by Secretary McAdoo, bringing the loans to that nation up to \$55,000,000 and the total loaned all the allies to \$1,043,000,000.

Greek Destroyer Sunk in Mediterranean Sea

PARIS, July 2.—The Greek destroyer Doxa, manned by French officers and crew, has been blown up in the Mediterranean. Twenty-nine men, including all the officers, were lost.

Americans to Parade Paris July 4

PARIS, July 2.—It was decided to parade one battalion of the United States army in Paris on July 4.

The American troops will arrive here on the morning of the third. They will be quartered in the Grand Palais, while the officers will be entertained at the Military club.

On the morning of the Fourth a French band will serenade General Pershing, playing patriotic airs beside his mansion window. Afterward the review will be the central figure in a commemorative ceremony at the Invalides, where he will be presented with a pennant by the Society of the Cincinnati of France and also with a new flag donated by the town of Le Puy, Haute-Loire.

M'CULLOUGH SUIT TO BE FIELD IN CAPITAL

Supreme Court and Not District Court Will Try Tulsa Sheriff Ouster Case.

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 2.—That the ouster suit against Sheriff William McCullough of Tulsa county would be tried in the state supreme court at Oklahoma City and not before the Tulsa district court was the statement made here tonight by Attorney-General Freeling.

The attorney-general said he would file the suit as soon as a transcript of the testimony taken in the case at Tulsa two weeks ago was made, which probably would be by the middle of this week.

CLOTURE RULE TO BE TRIED ON FOOD BILL

Administration Leaders Want to Force Vote on Measure by Thursday.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Contrary to a closure motion which was reached such an acute stage today that formal steps were taken by administration leaders to limit debate and force a final vote this week by invoking for the first time the senate's new cloture rule.

Within a half hour many more than the necessary 16 senators signatories to a closure motion were obtained. Senator Chamberlain, in charge of the bill, announced later that he would offer the motion tomorrow and ask for a vote Thursday.
