She Fights for Indians. "Jackson Day" will be observed by democrats at Oklahoma City. A thousand invitations have been issued for a banquet on the night of Jan. 8. Ten persons were injured in a free-for-all fight at Hickory, coal mine camp near Tulsa, New Year's night. A dance that was in progress was broken up. What is the matter with the church bells and the city whistles? This year came in without a blast from a whistle or a sound from a bell. There were 66 collisions in the state during 1916 and 521 derailments of all classes. Life loss amounted to 98 and personal injuries 2,091. Two passengers on railroad trains were killed.
