Former Plant Director Amplifies Statement Holding Kaiser to Be Personally Responsible.

WAS LONG PLANNED FOR

High Powers in Germany Prepared for Outbreak Muehlen Declares in Interview.

GUMLIGEN, Switzerland, Wednesday, June 6.—Germany was wholly in agreement with Austria-Hungary concerning the ultimatum sent to Serbia at the outbreak of the war, says Dr. Wilhelm Muehlen, former director of Krupp, in further disclosure on the responsibility for the bringing on of the conflict. Emperor William was personally responsible for Germany's participation and forced the German leaders to support his war policy.

Doctor Muehlen's first disclosure gives credence to a common view, conversations with Dr. Karl Hufferich, former vice chancellor and Dr. Krupp von Bohlen, chief owner of the Krupp works, in which both told him the emperor had discussed his agreement with Austria-Hungary on the ultimatum to Serbia and that Germany would mobilize immediately if Russia mobilized which would inevitably draw in the other powers and precipitate a universal war.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—A French report of the work of an American machine gun battalion which has recently been in action at Chateau Thierry includes the following: "On May 31 the enemy threatened to take Thierry, attempting to flank the town on our left and a breach was produced. The machine gun battalion, United States Army, was immediately thrown into Chateau Thierry with a colonial infantry battalion. Immediately the Americans reinforced the entire defense, especially at the ends of the bridge. Their courage and ability as marksmen evoked the admiration of all.
