WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—The question of whether Germany will surrender immediately or wait to be crushed through the advancing allied and American armies on the west front and the revolution at home, rested tonight with an extraordinary conference at German headquarters. Marshal Foch has given until 11 o'clock Monday morning, the time for the answer.

The American government was advised from Paris late today of the receipt of the German courier.

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KAISER REFUSES TO QUIT THRONE

Emperor Says He Can Not
Abandon Nation to An-
archy and Allies.

HE REPLIES TO SOCIALISTS

Ultimatum Issued by Party
Demanding Abdication
by Noon Today.

CROWN PRINCE IS INCLUDED

Renunciation by Frederick
William Is Another Con-
dition Laid Down.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 8.—Emperor William of Germany has declined to accede to the demands that he abdicate, says a German wireless dispatch picked up here tonight.

To the ultimatum of the socialists the emperor replied through Minister of the Interior Drows that he refused to abdicate voluntarily on the ground that he could not at the moment of peace undertake the terrible responsibility of handing over Germany to the anarchy and delivering up the country to anarchy.

BASEL, Nov. 8.—The abdication of Emperor William and the renunciation of the throne by Crown Prince Frederick William were demanded today by the managing committee of the German socialist party at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon to Prince Maximilian of Baden, the imperial chancery, according to the Correspondence Sozialiste, the official organ of the socialist party of Germany.

The managing committee of the socialist party considered the entire political situation and its decisions were embodied in the ultimatum which Philip Scheidemann, socialist member of the German cabinet without portfolio, sent to Chancellor Maximilian.

First—The right of public assembly. Second—The military and police must be ordered to exercise great restraint.

Third—The immediate transformation of the Prussian government in conformity with the views of the majority in the reichstag.

Fourth—Greater socialist influence in the reichstag.

Fifth—The abdication of Emperor William and the renunciation of the throne by the crown prince.

The imperial chancery was asked to reply before noon today, accepting the conditions. Otherwise the socialists declared they would withdraw from the government.

A Munich dispatch gives additional details of the meeting at which the republic was proclaimed.

The speakers were received with great enthusiasm. They all affirmed that the socialist party urged neither a strike nor revolution but desired only complete reform.

In a procession which was formed at which was a mile long, were many soldiers of all arms headed by a band. The procession marched to the royal palace and the ministries, where the government hurriedly posted appeals for the population to remain calm.

Repubic Proclaimed by Bavaria Is Report

BASEL, Nov. 8.—A republic has been proclaimed in Bavaria at the conclusion of a Reichstag meeting, according to a dispatch received here tonight from Munich, Bavaria.

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German Get Armistice Terms; 72 Hours Given to Accept Them

Prince Max Resigns
Hun Chancellorship
Says London Report

CONDITIONS TAKEN TO HEADQUARTERS

REICHSTAG WILL DISCUSS COURSE OF ACTION AND
REACH DECISION—PROPOSAL TO CEASE HOSTILITIES IS PROMPTLY REJECTED.

PARIS, Nov. 8.—Leaders of the various parties in the reichstag will meet tonight to determine the course to be taken on the conditions of the armistice, says a dispatch from Berlin to Berne printed in the Paris Temps this afternoon.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The German proposal for an immediate provisional suspension of hostilities has been rejected by Marshal Foch.

A German courier bearing the text of the conditions of the armistice has been sent to Spa, no other means of communication being practicable.

At allied general headquarters Friday morning the German plenipotentiaries, according to a French wireless message received here, received the conditions of the armistice as well as a formal demand that they should be accepted or refused within 72 hours, expiring on Monday morning at 11 o'clock French time.

The French wireless message picked up here is from the German delegates to the imperial chancery and the German high command. It concludes by asking that a courier be sent back as soon as possible with instructions.

The message from the German delegates reads: "From the German plenipotentiaries for an armistice to the imperial chancery and the German high command—Friday morning at allied general headquarters the plenipotentiaries received the conditions of an armistice as well as a formal demand that they be accepted or refused within 72 hours, expiring on Monday morning at 11 o'clock, French time.

"The German proposal for an immediate conclusion and provisional suspension of hostilities was rejected by Marshal Foch.

"Please acknowledge receipt and send back courier as soon as possible with your latest instructions. Sending of fresh delegates is not necessary for the moment."

Spa apparently is the headquarters of the German high command. The town is in Belgium 17 miles southeast of Liege and near the border of Prussia. Spa is about 100 miles northeast of La Capelle, near where the German emissaries entered the French lines.

DELEGATES ARE RECEIVED BY FOCH.
PARIS, Nov. 8.—The German delegates came tonight to the French lines last night to receive from Marshal Foch the allied terms for an armistice, proceeding this morning to the meeting place designated by the marshal.

The white flag bearers reached the left wing of General Debenny's army at 10 o'clock last night. They arrived at the place indicated by the allied supreme commander within the French lines about 2 o'clock this morning and passed the remainder of the night there.

The journey of the German courier to Spa and return will require far more time than the distance indicate, because of the difficulties of the roads under present conditions.

Therefore the receipt of the German reply is likely to be delayed a number of hours beyond the time possible under normal conditions.

Tonnage Transfer Not Recognized by England

LONDON, Nov. 8.—British wireless secretary Sir Laming Worthington-Evans, minister of blockade, announced today that reminders had been sent to the governments of neutral countries that the British government had always declined to recognize any transfers of enemy tonnage made during war, and that the neutral governments had been warned. His majesty's government would refuse to recognize either during or after the war any such transfer to neutral flag or ownership made before the final capture of the vessel, except with special consent.

The British government, the minister said, holds that the allies have a claim against the shipping of the neutral countries in view of their illegal submarine campaign, and that they do not intend to allow their claims to be defeated or reduced by any such transfer.

Killed During Celebration

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Mrs. Louise Thompson, widow of Howard N. Thompson, whose correspondent of the Associated Press at Paris and Petrograd, and her daughter Margaret, 19 years old, were killed last night at the height of the celebration in Youngkers over the false armistice reports when a automobile they struck and killed them under a trolley car. They were caught in a pocket in the crowd. Mr. Thompson died in 1913.

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 8.—Telegraphic communication between Amsterdam and Berlin, Luebeck, Bremen and Hamburg has been stopped at the request of the Berlin postal authorities. A report is current that there have been disturbances at Essen.

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 8.—Revolutionists have on the north German railway line north of Helsingor, in Schleswig-Holstein. This breaks communication from the north with Hamburg.

Some of the German warships from Kiel have arrived at Hamburg, in Schleswig. The Schleswigers of this city reports that officers were occupying them under the command of the captain.

The German ports of Helsingor, Aalborg and Copenhagen are in the hands of southern troops, the Schleswig Volks Zeitung says.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The government which resulted in the capture of virtually the entire German navy by revolutionary forces was carried out in a fairly peaceful manner, according to the Excelsior. To-morrow correspondent at Copenhagen. The red flag was hoisted only generally, he adds.

At Wilhelmshaven the naval officers agreed to hand authority over to the black flag, they would propose to place resistance against the British attack, he says.
